Emergency and transitional housing for released inmates.

- Chairperson Clarisa Alayeto introduces committee members and begins new business.
- Mayor's Office contracts with Fortune Society for emergency and transitional housing in Bronx.

Fortune Society's mission to provide support and resources for individuals with justice histories.

- Founder David Rothenberg started Fortune Society in 1967 after a play about an incarcerated person's real story sparked a conversation about prison conditions.
- Fortune Society provides comprehensive services including mental health treatment, substance abuse treatment, employment training, and lifetime aftercare.
- The organization has built a food and nutrition program to address food deserts in underresourced communities, providing 3 meals/day at service centers and housing locations.
- The organization has expanded its housing portfolio with a new building in the Bronx,
 bringing the total number of beds to 385, providing safe, stable, and affordable housing.

Affordable housing for formerly incarcerated individuals.

- Community Board 9 endorses Castle Gardens' emergency and transitional housing.
- Castle Gardens provides stable housing for formerly incarcerated individuals.
- The organization is developing two new buildings for formerly incarcerated individuals and the community, with 59 units for formerly incarcerated people and 24 units for the community.
- The organization is working with the community to address concerns about saturation of shelters and supportive housing, and to provide permanent supportive housing for those impacted by the justice system.

• The organization they lead, Fortune Society, provides holistic support to 11,000 people, including counseling, education, and job training, with a focus on seeing the best in people.

Providing housing and support services for formerly incarcerated individuals.

- Mr. Rob DeLeon, formerly incarcerated, emphasizes the importance of providing housing and job opportunities to help individuals rebuild their lives after serving their debt to society.
- Mr. Rob DeLeon highlights the need to challenge the narrative of good guys and bad guys, and instead recognize that people who have made mistakes deserve support and rehabilitation.
- Mr. Rob DeLeon explains how their organization provides transitional housing and wraparound services to help individuals reintegrate into society after criminal legal involvement.
- Mr. Rob DeLeon highlights the programming and activities residents engage in while living in Wales Avenue, including employment workshops, Freedom arts, and volunteering at a food pantry.

Housing support for formerly incarcerated individuals in NYC.

- Residents and community members can access services like job training and mental health support through the organization.
- Ms. Randi Rothschild explains the screening process for potential residents, including housing stability and programming participation.
- Eligibility criteria include being homeless or housing unstable and being a New York City resident.

Housing issues and police harassment in East Harlem.

- Mr. Dixon's apartment complex experiences violence and threats, leading to discharge of residents.
- They mention the project space he's been in and the possibility of him getting portable housing.

Transitional housing for formerly incarcerated individuals, including drug treatment and support services.

- The program prioritizes trust and vulnerability, encouraging participants to let go of coping mechanisms and rely on the program for support.
- Drug screening and residential aids are crucial in identifying and addressing any substance use issues, with a commitment to providing a safe and supportive environment for recovery.
- Peer support is a key component of the program, with individuals with lived experience of the criminal legal system and substance use serving as case managers and RAs.

The program prioritizes serving the local community, with a focus on ensuring that
participants are from the community and that the location is accessible and convenient for
them.

Housing for ex-offenders, community safety, and school concerns.

- Rehabilitation center assesses and screens individuals based on charges and potential risk to community.
- Randi Rothschild mentions 536 Wales Avenue is not SAR compliant, meaning individuals with certain level sex offender restrictions cannot live there.
- Concerns about lack of consultation with schools in the area, leading to potential safety risks for children.

Criminal justice reform and community involvement in the Bronx.

- Chairperson Clarisa Alayeto emphasizes the importance of collaboration and communication with local schools and community organizations to address social issues.
- Herman Francis Jr. raises concerns about the proximity of 27 methadone clinics within a five-block radius of a potential new school.

Investing in education and community programs to address criminal justice issues.

• Herman Francis Jr. discusses criminal justice reform, highlighting racial disparities and advocating for community-based solutions.

Parole system challenges and advocacy for reentry support.

- Mr. Stanley Richards explains how their organization fundraises and relies on government dollars to provide services.
- Member Claudia Rahman highlights the need for a food pantry to address clients' lack of food outside of the organization's meal program.
- Member Michael Pimentel asks questions about the building's history and future funding, while Rob DeLeon provides insights on the project's City Council support and potential risks.
- Member Michael Pimentel shares research on the parole system's challenges, including false reports by parole officers, highlighting the complexities of the criminal justice system.
- Parole officers play a crucial role in facilitating communication with clients on parole.
- Advocating for "blesses more" to reduce technical violations and prevent people from returning to the system.

Criminal justice reform and community safety in New York City.

 The community is concerned about balancing community need and safety, especially with shelters and supportive housing in the area.

- The organization has not received direct information on complaints but attends precinct council meetings to stay informed.
- Mr. Stanley Richards discusses the Fortune Society's role in the borough-based jail system, emphasizing the importance of community space and city resources for families of incarcerated individuals.
- Mr. Stanley Richards and others call for more resources in the borough-based jails, including access to benefits and city services, to support the well-being of both incarcerated individuals and their families.

Supporting individuals with housing and resources.

- The organization helps individuals with mental health and substance use issues find and maintain permanent housing.
- The organization provides support services such as job training, budgeting, and family reunification to help individuals achieve independence.
- Elevating community voices through liberation libraries and educational services.

Closing Rikers Island jail, investing in communities, and providing healthcare services.

- Mr. Stanley Richards is advocating for citywide advocacy on closing Rikers Island, investing in communities bearing brunt of mass incarceration.
- District manager Anthony Jordan has suggested site visits to provide wraparound services.

Supportive housing program for individuals struggling with addiction.

- Mr. Stanley Richards mentions the project was funded in 2020, and they didn't know when the community board would be notified.
- District Manager Anthony Jordan asks when the society started working with agencies to ensure standards are set for security cameras
- Mr. Stanley Richards explains the program's response to relapse, referring individuals for higher level of care.
- Community meetings and peer support are emphasized as crucial elements of the program.

Affordable housing project in Harlem, NYC.

- District Manager Anthony Jordan mentions that the program will select individuals for a tour
 of the facility and advisory council membership based on their level of involvement in the
 community.
- Councilmember Alayla supports the work of the organization and is adamant about ensuring that the community has a fair share of resources.
