Public & Supportive Housing Committee Minutes April 29th, 2024

Supportive housing and public housing in a district, with a presentation on what it can look like and how to implement it.

 Committee discusses supportive housing and public housing with Director of CHS Corporation, Patricia Hernandez.

Homelessness in NYC, with 89,000 people in shelters and 33,000 children.

- Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber invites Mrs. Hernandez to present on supportive housing.
- Mrs. Hernandez works for CSH, a nonprofit that lends to organizations developing supportive housing.
- 89,000 people in NYC shelters on a typical night, including 33,000 children.
- 2500 people on Rikers Island experience homelessness due to mental health issues.

Affordable housing and its importance for health and well-being in New York City.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez highlights the disproportionate impact of homelessness on black and Hispanic New Yorkers, and the need for prioritized housing for these groups.
- Housing affordability and quality are critical for overall health and well-being, with poor living conditions leading to increased risk of chronic diseases and mental health issues.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez discusses the housing continuum in New York City, including emergency shelter, safe havens, transitional programs, affordable housing, and supportive housing.
- Supportive housing is a key focus area, with residents paying 30% of their income towards rent, and advocacy efforts to ensure other systems are functioning well.

Supportive housing for vulnerable individuals, addressing misconceptions and providing individualized services.

• Member Michael Pimental explains supportive housing as affordable housing with wraparound services for vulnerable individuals.

• Supportive housing is not an institution, but rather a home with voluntary services tailored to each individual.

Supportive housing for homeless individuals, focusing on services and integration with community.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez disputes myth that supportive housing decreases property values.
- Supportive housing with services benefits entire community, not just tenants.
- Integration with community, not isolation, is key to successful supportive housing.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez: Voucher program challenging due to discrimination & limited services.
- Key components of quality supportive housing include housing first model, coordination, and community integration.
- Supportive housing targets households with multiple barriers, including involvement in child welfare and health issues.

Supportive housing for vulnerable populations in New York City.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez highlights the need for more supportive housing units for justice-involved individuals and those with behavioral health needs.
- Supportive housing programs have been shown to improve health outcomes, reduce healthcare costs, and increase medication adherence.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez discusses the importance of coordinated entry systems in housing programs, citing the need for a single-entry point for housing assessment and placement.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez highlights the challenges of developing and accessing supportive housing, including barriers such as inadequate funding and lack of resources.

Affordable housing challenges in NYC, including land availability, discrimination, funding, and accessibility issues.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez highlights inadequate housing supply and land costs as major challenges in addressing homelessness.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez emphasizes the importance of adequate funding for supportive housing services, citing significant discrepancies in service budgets across programs.

Supportive housing development and workforce challenges.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez highlights the importance of supportive housing for people with disabilities.
- Caseworkers face challenges such as generational and environmental disabilities, and organizations are working to address these issues through training and support systems.
- Organizations are prioritizing workforce development, including raises and trauma-informed care training, to improve the well-being of caseworkers and supportive housing providers.

Addressing homelessness among older adults, including challenges and potential solutions.

- Organizations face challenge of providing appropriate housing and services for individuals with high-risk behaviors, including substance use and mental illness.
- Integrated approach with specialized services and support can help address these challenges, as seen in the work of organizations like Lantern Community Services.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez explains the increase in elder homelessness is multifaceted, including displacement from nursing homes and high cost of living.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez highlights systems issues, such as lack of coordination and supportive housing units that cannot be held forever.

Affordable housing definitions and supportive housing services.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez clarifies that supportive housing in NYC means people who have been homeless for 2 years out of 4, regardless of mental illness.
- Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber confirms that affordable housing in NYC means 30% of household income, regardless of public assistance or zero income.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez explains supportive housing models, including congregate and noncongregate models.
- Location is crucial for supportive housing, with proximity to services and transportation important.
- Community residents with 24/7 staff provide high-level support for people with mental health issues.

Affordable housing and rent in New York City.

- Mr. Herman Francis Jr. discusses affordable housing, quality of service, and immigration in New York City.
- Herman Francis Jr. discusses affordable housing options and the federal government's role in supporting local communities.
- Mr. Herman Francis Jr. expresses concern about the rent burden and ownership.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez explains rent breakdown and subsidy in supportive housing buildings.

Supportive housing in NYC, community involvement, and political structure.

- Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber discusses NYCHA issues and supportive housing.
- Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber highlights the challenges of finding suitable housing for various populations.
- Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber expresses frustration with elected officials and political structure allowing for lack of support for quality housing in all neighborhoods.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez suggests looking into the Yes to Housing Coalition, run through the New York Housing Conference, to ensure quality supportive housing in each neighborhood.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez advocates for high-quality supportive housing with adequate service budgets to integrate within communities.
- Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber seeks a blueprint for public and supportive housing to address the housing crisis and homelessness.

Affordable and supportive housing, lending practices, and community involvement.

- Member Dalourny Nemorin and Mrs. Patricia Hernandez discuss affordable and supportive housing, fair share rules, and lending practices.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez shares insights on assessing quality and equity in lending, focusing on BIPOC developers and mental health support.

Supportive housing for people with mental health issues in NYC.

- Member Argelia Ortiz highlights the rent control situation as a major issue affecting all types of housing in NYC, particularly those in supportive housing and low-income areas.
- Member Argelia Ortiz emphasizes the need to address affordable housing, citing the challenges faced by people in qualifying for subsidized housing programs and the growing gap between haves and have-nots in NYC.
- Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber questions the lack of standardization in supportive housing, leading to concerns about accountability and quality.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez provides information on the state of supportive housing in the borough, citing a recent report by the Supportive Housing Network of New York.

Supportive housing for people with mental health and substance abuse issues.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez: "Housing support should be flexible and voluntary, not mandatory"
- Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber: "Legal standpoint: court orders for treatment are illegal"
- Member Dalourny Nemorin and Member Michael Pimental discuss issues with affordable housing in the Bronx, including lack of security and support for tenants.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez highlights the need for separate supportive housing for tenants with complex needs, as many in affordable housing also have issues that require case management.

Supportive housing policies and standards in New York City.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez emphasizes the importance of community involvement in supportive
 housing development, citing the need for providers to work with the community and address
 concerns about potential negative impacts.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez and Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber discuss the challenges of
 evaluating the quality of supportive housing providers, with Speaker 2 highlighting the need for
 more transparency and accountability in the sector.
- Member Dalourny Nemorin asks about funding models and supportive housing agency list.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez discusses supportive housing institute and intensive training for developers and nonprofits.

Supportive housing models and best practices.

- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez mentions 50,000 units of supportive housing for chronically homeless people in New York City.
- District Manager Anthony Jordan and Mrs. Patricia Hernandez discussed models for supportive housing, including caseload ratios and integration of healthcare settings.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez highlighted Staten Island's successful integrated model, which includes police department collaboration and trauma-informed care.

Funding supportive housing and services for vulnerable populations.

- District Manager Anthony Jordan advocates for community involvement in funding decisions.
- Community advocates seek accountability from developers in housing and services provision.

Community needs assessment and supportive housing for vulnerable populations.

- Community member expresses frustration with lack of understanding of service needs and inadequate partnerships.
- Member Ramona Ferreyra questions if supportive housing will serve the local community, citing overbooked shelters.
- Mrs. Patricia Hernandez suggests conducting asset maps for Bronx, tailoring services to specific populations.

Supportive housing for seniors, maintenance issues, and community concerns.

- Member Argelia Ortiz shares concerns about supportive housing, citing examples of poor maintenance and lack of services in newly built facilities.
- Member Argelia Ortiz and others express skepticism about supportive housing as a solution to the housing crisis, advocating for permanent housing instead.
- Residents express frustration with substandard living conditions in a New York City housing complex.
- Committee elects Member Michael Pimentel as Vice Chair.

Action Items

Contact CSH to arrange an asset mapping assessment of the community's service needs.

Draft a set of standards and policies for supportive housing developments aligned with evidence-based best practices (Public Housing and Supportive Housing Committee)

Engage with funding agencies like Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to advocate for sufficient service budgets for supportive housing.

Schedule a follow up meeting with CSH to continue developing the standards and explore partnership opportunities.
