### **Description of Services**

Urban Pathways Safe Haven: 1734 Webster Avenue, Bronx, NY 10457

Urban Pathways provides a full continuum of care to homeless and atrisk single adults throughout New York City, serving approximately 3,900 people each year. Following the successful operation of 3 Safe Haven programs in Manhattan and Brooklyn, Urban Pathways is developing a Safe Haven in the Bronx that will be located at 1734 Webster Avenue.

A Safe Haven is an alternative model to traditional shelter that is specifically designed to serve chronically street homeless adults. Safe Havens are smaller in size than traditional shelters, offer greater privacy to residents, provide more personalized service plans, and have fewer restrictions that make it easier for individuals to transition into services. Safe Haven programs practice a Housing First approach that provides shelter and services to individuals 24 hours, 7 days per week without contingencies. Clients can come and go from the program as they choose and are not required to abide by a curfew. Once people feel comfortable, they are then able to successfully work towards achieving their goals, whether that's achieving sobriety, addressing their health, or getting a job.


The Safe Haven program at Webster Avenue will have 60 beds available for homeless adults of any gender identity and is funded by the New York City Department of Homeless Services. Referrals will be made through street outreach teams, including BronxWorks, and community members. Those experiencing chronic street homelessness can be placed directly into a bed and are not required to go through the DHS central intake process. The services that will be provided include 3 meals per day, case management, medication management, housing placement assistance, life skills training, and access to Urban Pathways' employment program. Medical and behavioral health assessments will also be provided and referrals for appropriate care will be given. We are partnering with Care For the Homeless for physical and behavioral healthcare. The intended length of stay in the program is 6 – 12 months. However, no one will be forced to leave until they have access to the next level of housing, including supportive housing or permanent, independent housing, which our staff will support them in applying to.

The Webster Avenue Safe Haven will employ 34 staff members, which includes a Program Director, a Director of Social Services, Case Managers, Security, Maintenance, and Cooks.







- We maintain a direct care staff to resident ration of 1:4


Who is eligible to be a resident

- Medication monitoring and symptom management
- HIV education and referral for testing
- HRA/Medicaid assistance
- Access to psychiatric/Medical/dental services
- Strict evening curfew

Staff is on site 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.







## Reasons for Relocation

- Unable to expand capacity at current location
- Currently renting month to month (our previous lease expired February 2019) until a new location is found
- Teaming with NYS OASAS to find new location; OASAS will purchase property and develop facility; Bowen will be given the deed to facility once development has been completed
- Ownership will offer greater financial sustainability
- Relocation will allow for expansion from 20-beds to 30 beds (15 male | 15 women)
- The opioid epidemic has seen a rise in the need for services provided by ABLE House
- However, due to our space limitations, we have had to turn away patients
- An increase of 10 beds will help to insure that we will not have to turn patient's away in the future



## Why The Bronx?

- The Bowen Center has deep roots in The Bronx and many wonderful success stories
- In the past 20 years, 39 of ABLE House residents who have successfully completed the program have come from Bronx Community Board 6
- 94 out of 532 ABLE House residents that have successfully completed the program in the past 10 years, were Bronx residents.
- 20 of those successful individuals come from Bronx Community Board 6
- feel a strong bond to this community while none of them are directly from this community, we 10 of our current residents are from The Bronx, and
