In CB9 the primary entrance to the station will be on E. Tremont Ave in front of the Parkchester Apartments and will have elevator access, there will be an additional/secondary entrance on Unionport Rd.

None of the new stations will include retail, however, we can expect ticket vending machines, vending grab and go options, wayfinding at street level and inside, public spaces, and elevators at each station.

Some bridge repairs are necessary in order to complete this project, in CB9 the Bronx River Bridge will be under construction, however, service impacts will be avoided wherever possible.

Metro North Service won't begin until all 4 stations are complete, current projected date of project is 2027, however, delays are expected.

- **A.** Committee Description: The Parks and Recreation Committee represents the community's interests with regard to parks, park services and all park related matters and acts as a liaison between parks users and the New York City Parks Department.

Soundview Park Recreation Center Presentation Attached.

The recreation center will be located near the southern end of the Bronx River Parkway. This portion of the park contains a portion of mature specimen trees that will be relocated, tree restitution plan to be shared at a future opportunity. The center will have a storm water infiltration system, sustainable roofing, onsite renewables and a geothermal heating system.

Some pathways will need to be reworked to allow for optimal access, the main entrance will be on Metcalf Ave and will contain an enhanced crosswalk for pedestrians accessing from the south end. The center will have 3 floors and contain a gym, cardio and strength training areas, dance room, stretch & spin room, classroom, media lab, teen room, and a running track among other amenities. Funding for a pool was never allocated therefore, a pool is not a part of this project.

The entire center will be ADA Accessible.

The project will not contain parking for the general public.

All programs will be run by NYC Parks and Parks will have a say on usage of space.

There will be an opportunity for the display of local art work on the center walls, presentation on this item will take place at December's Social Services Committee Meeting.



Borough President Gibson Releases Topographic Bureau's 2023 Annual Development Report. The Bronx Experienced The Highest Level of Investment To Date, With \$4.3 Billion In Total Development

On October 28, 2024, Bronx Borough President Vanessa L. Gibson joined the Topographic Bureau in releasing their annual development report for 2023, highlighting the most successful year yet in total development funding for the borough. With over \$4.3 Billion dollars of investment across 357 individual properties, the report spotlights total investments made in both mixed-use (\$1.5 Billion) and residential development (\$1.7 Billion) last year. Notably, over 10,000 new residential housing units were also built in 2023. This is a significant milestone in the face of an ongoing housing crisis city-wide. The Borough President is very excited about this report, as it showcases the ever-growing level of development and opportunity here in the Bronx. Borough President Vanessa L. Gibson says, "This scale of investment is a positive reflection of our continued effort to revitalize The Bronx. Working together with our development leaders, Bronx businesses, community boards, non-profits, and elected officials, we achieved great economic growth last year and boosted the local economy, created jobs, and further enhanced the quality of life for all Bronx residents." A featured development from 2023 is the Penn Access

Project, which will create four ADA-accessible Metro-North Railroad stations in Hunts Point, Parkchester/Van Nest, Morris Park, and Co-op City. This large-scale public investment will be the biggest expansion of Metro-North's service since its founding in 1983.

Borough President Gibson said she wanted to thank the New York City Department of Parks & Recreation, the Morris Park Business Improvement District; Go! Sports NYC; Council Member Kristy Marmorato; State Senator Nathalia Fernandez; Assembly Member Michael Benedetto; and everyone else who supported our Skate Party this weekend. **Bronx Borough President Gibson** said "Together, we are fostering connections with our community and encouraging healthy, active lifestyles for our residents."

Borough President Gibson Seeks Up To \$20 Million In State Money To Support Economic Development In Morris Park And Along The Harlem River In The South Bronx

October 18, 2024, the application period for the Downtown Revitalization Initiative (DRI) program was completed. As part of the application process, **Bronx Borough President Gibson** submitted two applications for the state to consider. One was for the Greater Morris Park area, and the other for the Harlem River Gateway District. Borough President Gibson worked with numerous stakeholders across The Bronx to identify capital projects that would support these communities and benefit from DRI funding.

The Greater Morris Park DRI area has general boundaries of Pelham Parkway to the north, Hutchinson River Parkway to the east, East Tremont Avenue and Westchester Avenue to the south, and Bronx Park and White Plains Road to the west. It includes the neighborhoods of Morris Park, Van Nest, Westchester Square, Indian Village, and Pelham Parkway. Existing Business Improvement Districts (BIDs) within the Greater Morris Park DRI include the Morris Park, Westchester Square, and White Plains Road BIDs. This area is a top 10 job center for New York City and will soon see two new Metro-North stations as part of the Penn Station Access project. A recent rezoning was approved along with \$500 million in capital to support the community. Borough President Gibson in her recommendation as part of the rezoning process, stated her commitment to the Morris Park community, and is showing that with action.

As part of the application, 32 projects were identified, totaling approximately \$105 million in capital-requested funding. The wide range of projects includes beautification projects, public park improvements, and transit, traffic, and pedestrian infrastructure projects. In an equally important application, the Harlem River Gateway District has seen a significant influx of new

<u>development and investment in recent years, but these increases have also brought additional needs.</u>

"The South Bronx has seen tremendous growth in the past few years, which is a testament to the resiliency and vitality of our borough," said **Borough President Gibson**. "It is our mission to ensure this community receives the necessary capital investment to undo years of economic neglect and stimulate continued growth and prosperity."

The Harlem River Gateway District has general boundaries of the Harlem River to the west, the Harlem River and Bronx Kill to the south, the Bruckner Expressway to the east, and East 149th Street to the north. It includes the neighborhoods of Mott Haven and Concourse. Over recent years, the Bronx waterfront has been studied, and these studies have helped transform the community into a regional destination.

"With the Yankees, the recently opened Bronx Children's Museum, and the world's first Hip Hop Museum opening in 2025, this area has opportunities to draw in visitors year-round," said **Bronx Borough President Gibson.** "Between the tourism and all the new housing being developed, residents need places to buy their groceries and do their shopping, so there is a huge need for capital improvements to help support all this new economic activity."

This application had 14 projects totaling over \$61 million in capital-requested funding, including beautification projects, public park improvements, and infrastructure projects.

The 2024 cycle marks the eighth round of DRI applications which will invest \$100 million in 10 new communities that will be selected by the Regional Economic Development Council (REDC), with The Bronx being located in the New York City REDC. This program is a cornerstone of the State's economic development program, led by Governor Kathy Hochul to transform downtown neighborhoods into vibrant centers that offer high quality of life and are magnets for redevelopment, business, job creation, and economic and housing diversity. The Bronx received a previous DRI award in 2018 for the Bronx Civic Center neighborhood.

"I am optimistic that this is the time for The Bronx to receive additional capital investment," said **Bronx Borough President Vanessa L. Gibson.** "I am very proud of these two applications and believe state funding would go a long way in supporting these communities."

While **Borough President Gibson** has submitted two applications, only one can be awarded to each REDC in any year. This is a competitive process, and multiple applications are expected to be submitted to the New York City REDC.

"This is a competitive process, so we needed to put in a high-quality application, I believe we did that as both have been a labor of love. I will continue to advocate and fight for The Bronx and look for as many capital opportunities as possible to support our great borough," said **Borough President Gibson.** "We know both applications cannot receive the award, so we will continue working with community residents and stakeholders to find ways to support them, and I will be applying again for two communities in 2025. I invite all Bronx residents to contact our office if you have capital projects that need support and could be eligible for future DRI funding."

The winning DRI applications are expected to be announced in early 2025

Borough President Gibson's Statement On DOHMH Data That Shows Citywide Decrease In Opioid-Related Deaths. *Opioid Deaths In The Bronx*Remain High. Opioid Fatalities Continue to Disproportionately Impact Black And Brown New Yorkers.

Borough President Gibson said, "The citywide data released by the NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene is encouraging and highlights the tireless efforts of our healthcare professionals and community advocates on the front lines, diligently working to save lives. However, while we celebrate this progress, we must also recognize that Bronx residents remain disproportionately impacted by this epidemic." The BP proudly announced a \$6 million capital investment in the Lincoln Opioid Recovery and Bridge Clinic at Lincoln Hospital, which focuses on providing patient-centered care to individuals struggling with opioid abuse. Borough President Gibson mentioned she will soon announce Narcan training sessions in partnership with the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, equipping Bronxites with the tools to potentially save lives and support our efforts to combat the opioid epidemic. She will also continue to advocate for The Bronx to get an equitable share of the Opioid Settlement Fund so we can reinvest in our communities that have been adversely affected by this epidemic. By further prioritizing harm reduction strategies and holistic care services, Bronxites will receive the care they deserve to overcome addiction and lead healthy, fulfilling lives.

Borough President Gibson Calls For Expanded Tree Canopy Coverage In Community Boards 1-6. Declares Extreme Heat During The Summer A Public Health & Safety Issue

September 19, 2024, **Borough President Vanessa L. Gibson** joined Senior Environmental Protection and Community Relations Manager at WM, Jay Kaplan; Natural Areas Conservancy Executive Director, Sarah Charlop-Powers, President of Bronx Council for Environmental Quality President, Robert Fanuzzi, Ph.D.; Co-Founder of South Bronx Unite, Mychal Johnson; President of Friends of Pelham Bay Park, and Founder of Loving the Bronx, Nilka Martell; and

others south of 98 Lincoln Avenue on the Bronx Waterfront in the Mott Haven section to call for action to be taken to address tree canopy coverage disparities in Community Boards 1-6 that contributes to extreme heat conditions that threaten the health and safety of elderly residents and Black New Yorkers. "Despite being the greenest borough, the distribution of trees and greenspaces is not equitable and is disproportionately affecting our most vulnerable residents." said Bronx Borough President Vanessa L. Gibson. "Today's presser is a call to action and attention to address these disparities, which contribute to poor air quality in the South Bronx, and extreme heat, further exacerbating pre-existing health conditions that can lead to heat-related illness or heat-related mortality. We are grateful to have advocates, colleagues in government, and private partners who care about these issues and are committed to working with us to protect the health of our residents and families. According to a report on heat related mortality released by the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene in June, about 350 heat-related deaths occur in our city each year. Mortality records from New York and other cities across the country have shown that heat kills along age, socioeconomic, and racial lines. Black New Yorkers and older adults are more likely than other New Yorkers to die from heat - both directly and due to exacerbating underlying medical conditions. High levels of heat affecting the Bronx have numerous causes, including the heat island effect, which causes urban areas to have higher levels of heat than outlying rural areas. One of the prevailing factors contributing to the heat island effect is a lack of vegetation. Additionally, an insufficient number of trees and other green space has other effects, including elevated levels of air pollution and increased sewer system overflows during heavy rain events. Mott Haven has 14% tree canopy coverage, and Hunts Point is even lower at 8%, two of the lowest coverage rates of any neighborhoods in the city. With these communities also experiencing high rates of health disparities, we must see immediate change to improve the health and safety of those who live here. At the press conference, the Borough President and advocates called this issue a threat to public health and safety and are demanding additional action to be taken by the city and private entities to address these disparities. Along with calling for a 1% investment in the FY 2026 city budget towards city parks with a focus on neighborhoods with less tree canopy coverage, Borough President Gibson is calling for our private partners to also join with us to invest in initiatives that support existing green spaces or the establishment of new trees and/or parks in neighborhoods with significant need.

 - 1. To be eligible, applicants must be U.S. citizens or qualified noncitizen, receive either SNAP, Cash Assistance or SSI, or have a monthly gross income below the current income guidelines for your household size
 - 2. If eligible, applicants will receive one regular HEAP benefit per program year and are also eligible for emergency HEAP if at risk for a utility shut off or running out of fuel.

B. Summer EBT Benefits:

- 1. Take action now to make the most of your Summer EBT benefits! If you've received Summer EBT benefits this year, it's important to know that the first round of benefits is set to expire on November 28th. Your benefit expiration date is based on the specific date your child's benefits were issued. Be sure to use the remaining funds before they disappear! Benefits do not roll over into the next year, so don't miss out on the assistance available to you.
- C. Hunts Point Social Security Office is moving to their new location at 460 Willis Avenue in Mott Haven starting on November 18th. The office will be serving zip code 10454. Their last day at the Hunts Point location is November 14th.
- D. FEMA: FEMA has opened the application window for the third round of <u>Flood Mitigation Assistance Swift Current</u> funding to make \$660 million in funding available to National Flood Insurance Program policyholders across the nation to improve flood resilience. The last eligible disaster declaration date is May 31, 2025. Applications are being reviewed on a rolling basis. Please reach out

to NYS DHSES for more information about how to pursue this funding in New York.

E. New York's Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) renewed funding:

- 1. Expansion in funding for the affordable child care program New York's Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP)
- 2. Eligible families can use CCAP to pay for part or all of their child care costs, including after school care. Families in New York City are able to conveniently apply for CCAP via the MyCity application.
- 3. How to Apply for the NYS Child Care Assistance Program using the MyCity digital portal (NYC residents) VIDEO
- 4. Toll-free parent referral line staffed with parent counselors who are ready to assist families locate child care that's suited to their needs. The parent referral line can be reached at **1-888-469-5999**.
- 5. Information about the Consortium can be found on their website at https://nyccrr.org/. Parents can also search for licensed child care providers, including school-age child care (SACC) programs, in their area on the OCFS website at https://ocfs.ny.gov/programs/childcare/looking/ccfs-search.php or on the NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) website at https://a816-healthpsi.nyc.gov/ChildCare/search.action. Additionally, general information on CCAP is available on the Office of Children and Family Services website by visiting https://ocfs.ny.gov/programs/childcare/ccap/.

F. NYCHA portal for Rental Arrears

- 1. Applications will be available on the NYCHA Self Service Portal starting on Thursday, October 17th, 2024 and the application will only be available to households they deem as eligible, based on their data.
- 2. Assistance programs will cover rental arrears from March 2020 to May 2023, and will cover a total of 18 months.
- 3. Encouraged to submit applications as soon as possible, and availability is based on program funding.

G. NYC Heating Law

- 1. Heat season is from October 1 to May 31. Building owners must maintain an indoor temperature of at least 68 degrees between 6-10 AM when it is below 55 degrees. From 10 PM-6 AM, indoor temperature must be at least 62 degrees, regardless of outside temperature.
- 2. If this is not the case, please reach out to 311 to file complaints and HPD will visit the apartment and issue a violation to the landlord. Remember to document your 311 service request number.
- H. **SNAP skimming replacement deadline** has been extended to **December 20, 2024**. DSS will continue to consider claims as long as the theft occurred on or before December 20th and was filed 30 days after it was discovered.
- I. NYC Department of Citywide Administrative Services
 - 1. Released their monthly exam schedule for civil service jobs. All dates are tentative and are subject to change. Please inquire with the agency to secure a waiver for the application fee.



Regularly, I hear from community members like you about how residential and commercial surveillance camera footage has helped prove the commission of a crime or someone's innocence. This critical evidence is necessary to my office's effort to pursue justice with integrity and I need your help learning more about these privately owned cameras.

Participation in this program is completely voluntarily and easy. If you are the owner of a security camera, simply fill out the included Bronx C.A.M.S. form and return it to my office. With this information, we can create a confidential map—that will never be released to the public—of camera locations around the Bronx and information on how to retrieve the footage. When a crime is committed and the footage is useful to law enforcement, members of my office will contact you or your designee to view and request a copy.

This tour aims to provide participants with a basic understanding of the criminal justice system. The Bronx District Attorney's Office Court Tour has three essential parts. The Detective Squad Complaint Room and Arraignments.

Detective Squad

Participants gain a unique understanding of how Law Enforcement Officers use skills and technology to catch criminals. Bonus: These Detectives are funny and personable, humanizing all officers.

Complaint Room

Participants are given a walkthrough of where the Assistant District Attorneys are initially presented with the cases and the victims.

Arraignments

Participants can understand how the court process works, and how each side (the people and the defendant) is represented, If Sgt. Tirado is not there, and then the ADA can take the students to the 2nd floor and explain the court process from arrest to trial, then let the court officers on the 2nd floor know that you have a tour. They will advise you to go into either AR1 or AR2, depending on space availability, if the tour is running late, you should only stay for one case.

Please try not to give your opinion of controversial cases (try to divert from these discussions), and of course, do not discuss any ongoing cases.
