Note: The Chairperson asked the audience to stand and pledge allegiance to the flag and a moment of silence.

Assemblyman Luis Sepulveda, representing the 87th Assembly District, spoke to the audience. The Assemblyman, Senator Diaz, Senator Klein, Assemblyman Crespo, and CB have put together a series of Fire Safety Seminars. Mr. Sepulveda added that he has collected donations for the individuals affected by the fire in the West Farms Area. He says his office looks like an aid relief center. He announced that the Governor released the budget proposal. The State of New York will have a potential 6 million budget gap. Assemblyman Sepulveda announced his annual spelling bee event for 3rd, 4th, 5th graders. He announced other events such as teaching Children how to Code, African American Abrazo, etc.

2. Councilmember-Elect Ruben Diaz Sr., representing the 18th Council District, spoke to the audience. He introduced himself as the new Councilmember-Elect.

Fire Safety Seminar Presentation

Public Session

- 1. Ms. Adaline Walker Santiago, Chairperson of Community Board 7, was the first guest speaker. Ms. Santiago came to the podium to speak about Hope House. She says that they claim they are not a shelter but the way they operate is the way a shelter operates and that the community should not allow Hope House to operate.
- **2. Ms. Topeka King Sams**, Founder of Ladies of Hope Ministries, was the second guest speaker. Ms. Sams announced that a group of individuals within Hope House are trying to sabotage the organization. She says that the organization is necessary to have and that she will continue to service individuals who are in need for as long as possible.
- 3. Ms. Myisha Taylor-Mike, was the third guest speaker.

Note: The speaker was not present at the meeting. The Chairperson moved on to the next guest speaker.

- **4. Mr. Rogier F. Van Vlissingen**, a public member, was the fourth guest speaker. Mr. Vlissingen is developing a support group for individuals who are interested in plant based nutrition. He says at Saint Helena's Church individuals can prepare plant based dishes, sample them, and give feedback.
- **5.** Luis Armand, Director of Strategic Partnership for the Department of Corrections, was the fifth guest speaker. He announced several correction officers exams posted and their salaries.
- **6. Ms. Briana Reeves & Bruce**, were the sixth guest speakers. Einstein and Montefiore. He announced that the National Cancer Institute issued special funding for a community health survey.
- **7. Mr. Walter Nestler**, a public member, was the seventh guest speaker. He submitted two letters to the Board addressed to the Conflict of Interest Board to open an investigation on a project discussed at a Committee meeting on December 4th.
- 8. Mr. Raji Kopi, was the eighth guest speaker.

Note: the speaker was not present at the meeting. The Chairperson moved on to the next guest speaker.

- **9. Ms. Donnie Walker Santiago** was the ninth guest speaker. Ms. Walker spoke at the behest and for the residents of Saint Andrews Village. She says that Saint Andrews Village opposes Hope House and its plans. She said that Ms. Topeka King Sams came to the neighborhood under false pretenses. She reiterated that Saint Andrews Village opposes Hope House.
- 10. Mr. Michael Beltzer, a public member, was the tenth guest speaker. He thanked individuals for their support at the NYCHA rally. Mr. Beltzer announced that he wants to have another Community Board application seminar for teens so that the Board can include younger members.
- 11. Mr. Lothar Krause, from Saint Andrews Village, was the eleventh guest speaker. He announced that the residents of Saint Andrews Village were displeased with the Board and how they failed to stay neutral when it came to Hope House. He read some quotes from the meeting and asked to keep it mind that while the job is voluntary, they should stay neutral in every affair within the community.

Elected Officials Report

- 1. Mr. Andy Toledo, from the Bronx Borough President's Office, was the first representative speaker. He reminded the Board Members to submit their re-appointment applications. He addressed the audience and encouraged them to apply to be a Board Member. He announced that the office is partnering up with the Department of Finance to help homeowners.
- **2. Mr. Ramon Cabral,** from Congressman Jose E. Serrano's Office, was the second representative speaker. He announced that the Congressman has been working towards stopping all the programs from closing due to budget cuts. He shared his contact information with the audience. He announced that there will be a new Postmaster for USPS.
- **3. Ms. Onelis Ramirez,** from Assemblyman Marcos Crespo's Office, was the third representative speaker. She announced the services the office offers, where the office is located, and contact information.
- **4. Mr. Antirson Ortiz,** from the NYC Comptroller's Office, was the fourth representative speaker. He announced that the Comptroller is investing away from fossil fuels. He added that the Comptroller is tackling the issue with no heating in NYCHA developments.
- 5. Ms. Jessica Reynoso, from the Public Advocate's Office, was the fifth representative speaker. She announced that the office is investigating the heating issue in NYCHA and she gave contact information for lead testing.

6. Mr. Andy Sales, from Senator Klein's Office, was the sixth representative speaker. He announced that senator Klein has partnered with the Immigration of Blacks Institute. They offer socials services on many levels. He announced that Senator Klein is having an open call in regards to NYCHA quality of life issues.

Note: The Chairperson put a motion on the floor to go into the Business Session. The motion was seconded by Ms. Felipa Manaiza. The vote was unanimous. The motion was passed.

Chairperson's Report

The Chairperson announced that Board Applicants can now be 16 and 17 years of age in order to add youth into the Boards. He announced on January 26th, there will be a hearing in regards to the NYC Waterboard Hearing. He iterated about the fire within our Community and to please check on fellow neighbors, check your home, etc.

District Manager's Report

The District Manager announced that the next Fire Safety Seminar will be tomorrow and will be hosted by the Community Board. He announced that the Board has received 3 FOILS and that the Board will comply with the requests. He added that the Commander of the 43rd Pct was promoted to 2-star chief. He announced the new office aide, Ms. Sanzida Tuldker. He thanked and praised the Department of Sanitation for their work before, during and after the snow storm and cleanup in overpasses.



Introduction

- A. Committee Chair, Board Members & Guest
- **B.** The Youth & Education Committee represents the community's interests with regards to education and programs that target the youth and acts as a liaison between community members and the NYC Department of Education including Parent Advocates, PTA's, Educators and Principals, School Safety, the Administration for Children Services, the District Attorney's Office, NYC Department of Youth & Development and local organizations and nonprofits

Guest Speakers

A. Luc James Dieudonne, Forever DC Mentorship Program Representatives spoke on behalf of the Forever DC Mentorship Program. The purpose of this program is to introduce financial literacy to youths ages 13-21. Daquan Cooper is the inspirational for this organization. He was a youth killed in Parkchester some time ago. Due to Daguan's entrepreneurship, in his honor, this organization's purpose is to teach youths skills in areas such as the stock market, investment in real estate, budgeting, saving, and entrepreneurship. With the program Pick Your Passion, this organization plans to match an inspiring artist with a leader in their field to mentor them. The program is hoping to launch in June. They have reached out to other organizations for partnership. Their hope is that the launch event will be a basketball tournament. The program is also looking to host a school supply giveaway and donate supplies to local schools. One of the organizations' long term goal is establishing an after school program. They hope to integrate with other community programs and nonprofits that are already working with the youth in the community. Their hope is to partner with local after school programs to present their program/curriculum. They are also hoping to expand outside of the Bronx and NYS eventually. The organization also hopes to create community centers which they feel is a need that is in high demand within the community.

As per BM Venus Williams, will this be a co-ed mentorship program. As per Forever DC Mentorship Program representative, yes, this will be co-ed.

As per Chairman Himidian, please elaborate on Pick Your Passion. As per Forever DC Mentorship Program rep. Pick Your Passion is going to be a fundamental part of the organization. We will present youths with options throughout various art fields in order to partner them with a mentor most aligned with their interest.

As per Chairman Himidian, is this program established anywhere as of yet? As per Forever DC Mentorship, they are still in the process of building.

As per Chairman Himidian, Sotomayor Center may be ideal for this program. Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club may also be a good fit.

As per BM Venus Williams, Forever DC Mentorship should also come to present at CB9's general board meeting later this month. Ms. Williams also volunteered to be a mentor with this program. Program was also invited to attend a College Prep Course.

B. Lloyd Donders, Special Education Law Attorney

Mr. Donders arrived late but was available to present. Mr. Donders is a special education attorney who has a son with special needs. He went through a battle to get his son the services he needed and as Mr. Donders, this made him think of all the kids that are unable to get the services they need. Specifically in areas of low income and resources where parents do not have money to pay for legal fees. As a Special Education Attorney Mr. Donders helps children get the support they need and are entitled to from their school. Mr. Donders educates parents as to what their kids are entitled to. When a child is wronged, and case is won, the schools pay for his attorney fee. Federal Laws are the ones that are in place for children with special needs. The state laws are there to implement the federal mandate. Mr. Donders explained Child Find, which means that schools are obligated to go out and find children wo are in need of special education services. Evaluations was another topic of discussion. Mr. Donders knows how to get parents free private evaluations for this children. FAPE is very basic to special education. It stands for Free Appropriate Public Education. If school does not give them appropriate education than parents have the right to sue schools to achieve this. Mr. Donders also explained Least Restrictive Environment. This means that Children with disabilities have to be educated with everyone else/non-disabled peers. Early Intervention Services is for children within the ages of 0-2 not meeting their milestone, NYDOH is responsible for giving these children services. CPSE: Committee on Pre-School Special Education is handled by the district and is for children 3-5 years old. Mr. Donders focuses on Committee of Special Education, which services children Ages 5-21 years old with special education needs. These children are entitled to education until they graduate from high school or until they turn 21. IDEA-Individual with Disabilities Education Act is a federal law to keep in mind. Independent Education Evaluation-IEE, is an evaluation of a student thought to have a disability by a qualified examiner not employed by the district. The issue is that evaluations by DOE, as Mr. Donders, are poor. As a result, he advises clients that an IEE is done. Mr. Donders can get parents with little money the same evaluation that a parent with money is able to afford as this will be paid by the district. NYC DOE is the largest school district in the country, it has 1.1 million students and 1,800 schools of which 2,000 students have IEPs-Individual Educational Program. When IEP's are not kept, Mr. Donders as an attorney can get private services for these students. By state law, DOE is required to give parent training and counseling to help manage children at home. Schools do not always have the ability to provide services in schools for what children need, so they give parents vouchers of providers nearby, however, the vast majority of people on the list do not participate in related services because DOE does not pay competitive rates. As per Mr. Donders this should not be the responsibilities of the parents. As a result, 91% of these vouchers are not being used. Mr. Donders works to get children who have not received these services, services with a private service provider paid for by district as a result of lawsuit. Pamphlets and business cards were shared with meeting participants and board members.

As per Chairman Himidian, Mr. Donders may be interested in being a mentor or can maybe point Forever DC Mentorship Program in the direction of a mentor.

In response to a participant's question, Mr. Donders stated that in the IEP process parents are an active members and are able to be involved in the determination of services.

C. New teacher Peter Rosado at St. Helena's Elementary School and BM at Bronx CB2 was present to talk to committee regarding St. Helena's condition. As per this teacher, the school is 75 years old and looks 75 years old. He is requesting assistance with locating funding for improvements in the school. As per Mr. Rosado, low enrollment in archdiocese schools due to competing enrollment from charter schools and lack of additional city funding has been affecting the quality of archdiocese schools. As per Mr. Rosado, the school has experienced wifi shortage and lack of resources such as laptops and electronics. As per BM Venus Williams, CB9 is able to draft a letter of support to elected officials regarding requesting wifi and computers as a donation on behalf of CB9. As per Chairman Himidian, have you looked into grants? There is also computer sites that have sponsorship programs to some capacity. As per BM Venus Williams, in regards to the cosmetic of the school, she suggested throwing a paint party and inviting the community to paint. As per Chairman Himidian, St. Helena's should contact Councilmember Diaz in regards to funding for computers.

As per BM Venus Williams, Mr. Rosado should explore DELL as a donation source as well as Optimum. As per Chairman Himidian, you should also check with Verizon.

As per BM Venus Williams, Home Depot can also participate with supplies for a paint job and invite local electeds, media and community members.

As per Chairperson Himidian, school should also check Clinton Foundation and Bill Gates Foundation. CGI in 125th Street is definitely a place to go to. Councilmember Salamanca may also be a good venue for pointing Mr. Rosado in the right direction for city funding

New Business

A. Easter Egg Hunt and College Prep Course were tabled by Committee Chair Venus Williams in consideration of time.

Introduction

A. Committee Chair, Board Members & Guest

B. The Land, Zoning, Planning Committee represents the community's interests with regard to the use of land, zoning, landmark, building, etc. and acts as a liaison between community members and Department of City Planning, Department of Buildings & the New York City Economic Development Corporation.

Notices

A. Notices were discussed with participants present.

Speakers

A. Walter Nestler read a description regarding Hope House to participants and inquired if there were any disagreements with the description being read aloud. As per Mr. Nestler, "people are not understanding the concerns of the residents or not vocalizing them clearly." Homeowners are preoccupied with the safety of children, seniors, neighboring owners and tenants, security of homes and property, quality of life issues, decline in property values, etc. All houses were built the same way and at the same time in this community. As a result, homeowners are as close as they are because they all moved in at the same time. There has been very little turnover in the community.

As per Mr. Nestler, the make-up of the houses does not allow for the number of people that will be living in Hope House. There will be 7 people living in that house as per a newspaper article and testimony given at the sub-committee meeting.

As per a resident's inquiry, is it zoned that someone can flip a house like this?

As per Chairman Himidian, we are still waiting on feedback regarding this zoning issue.

As per a St. Andrew's Village resident, St. Andrew's Village would like to request another letter of support from CB9 where CB9 states that they are against Hope House. The letter that CB9 wrote and shared previously, as per resident, was too vague.

As per another resident, St. Andrew's Village is composed of community homeowners whereas Hope House participants are all from outside the community. Homeowners all agree that the behavior of Hope House representatives at the previous CB9 General Board meeting was unbecoming. They insisted that CB9 take the side of the community members and homeowners in this debate.

As per Chairman Himidian, he was unaware that any threats had been made. In regards to a video that residents claimed was posted by Hope House following the meeting, Chairman Himidian clarified that he only became aware of this video the Friday evening before this committee meeting. Chairman Himidian also stated that although he supports the concept of the program as St. Andrew's Village Homeowners questioned, he never agreed the program should be in their neighborhood. He explained that he as well lives next to people that have been formerly incarcerated but homeowners insisted that this is different being that Chairman Himidian rents and does not own property therefore he has the liberty to move at any time if desired.

As per St. Andrew's Village homeowners association, they have not yet received what they requested from CB9. This includes a letter from CB9 to the Dept. of Probation and the Dept. of Buildings, as well as a letter to the Elected Officials.

As per residents they do not want any promotion stating that they want to come to an agreement regarding this matter as they are strongly opposed.

As per District Manager Rivera, CB9 is hoping to finalize a date with local elected officials for the town hall where CB9 will discuss their findings from Dept. of Probations and Dept. of Buildings on Certificate of Occupancy. Senator Klein's Office is investigating with state and federal agencies regarding this matter, especially state parole and state attorney general.

As per DM Rivera, NYPD will be invited to town hall but NYPD does not oversee, authorize or conduct any business with formerly incarcerated unless there is an ongoing investigation. As per DM Rivera, CB9 is pushing for the town hall on February 13th.

As per Walter Nestler, the longer this matter is postponed the more people that may move into the home in question. St. Andrew's Village residents stated their distrust with Chairman Himidian based on the previous meeting that was held with Hope House. St. Andrew's Village also stated that CB9 should remain neutral. Resident also stated that the vetting process for Hope House participants is very poor.

As per a statement from the Director of Hope House at a public event, she claimed that they don't look at the crimes participants committed although they had assured residents that they would be considerate of which participants were brought into the house.

As per resident, Doni Walker Santiago, she would like CB9 to draft a letter in support of St. Andrew's Village Homeowners Association and asked that this letter be put to a vote as well as investigate who allowed Topeka Sam authority to record inside Kips Bay when her organization does nothing to benefit the children or parents of the children of this program. Additionally, her Certificate of Incorporation is to solicit donations and to open a shelter and Ms. Walker Santiago would like CB9 to look into this. Homeowners do not care about Topeka Sam renting the house but they do care about the house being used for a business. They are also concerned that Hope House is collecting funds as donations without being a registered organization. Homeowners are also concerned about the declining value of their properties. As per Chairman Himidian, DM Rivera will follow-up and contact Dept. of Buildings and ask them for clarification on what a two family, residential R5 is allowed to do legally and for the definition of what constitutes a family. As per residents, Hope House filed officially as being opened for use as a shelter.

As per Chairman Himidian, DM Rivera will follow-up with Dept. of Corrections, City of Probation, and Dept. of Buildings to assure that they will be in attendance at the town hall. As per St. Andrew's Village residents, Bronx Borough President should be invited to the town hall meeting, as well as City Councilman Salamanca, Assemblyman Crespo, Councilmember Gjonaj, and Senator Rivera.

As per Chairman Himidian, DM Rivera will draft a letter to all elected officials involved with all the concerns from this meeting and inquire regarding when the town hall meeting will take place. Residents requested that elected officials involve an attorney to look into the matter of hosting a business in this home being that formerly incarcerated individuals that will be living in home are not related and are transient. CB9

can copy Ray at the BP's Office when emailing DOB because they can offer legal assistance. Residents requested that CB9 enforce sited state rule 7, which Topeka Sam is trying to appeal. Residents would also like CB9 to investigate what the 5th bedroom will be used for and request that CB9 draft a letter of support that is unconditional and that it be brought to the board as a resolution to be voted on. The letter should state that it would be inappropriate to have this program in an R5 zone like St. Andrew's Village.

As per St. Andrew's Village Homeowners Association, when Topeka Sam was questioned as to why the program didn't come to the community board first her response was that she didn't do so because she didn't want anyone to have any regulations over how she wanted to get things done.


As per DM Rivera, before a motion for a resolution is done by committee, feedback from DOB should be given to see if the project is even allowed so that the resolution can be informed and if so, it then should be presented to committee for discussion after the town hall when more facts are brought to light. St. Andrew's Village requested CB9 draft a letter stating that given the new information that has come to light CB9 is in complete support of the community in not wanting Hope House in St. Andrew's Village. St. Andrew's Village opposes and rejects the previous letter that was drafted by CB9 because despite the letter containing the request for a meeting with the elected officials (completed) and a town hall meeting (date TBD); the letter did not contain language pertaining to their concerns. The homeowners will not tolerate another outburst from a member of the Hope House. Homeowners would like police presence at the town hall meeting.









FRONT ELEVATIONS

Introduction

- A. Committee Chair, Board Members & Guest
- **B.** Committee Description: The Parks and Recreation Committee represents the community's interests with regard to parks, park services and all park related matters and acts as a liaison between parks users and the New York City Parks Department.

Speakers/Presentations

A. Mohammed Mujumder, President of the Bangladesh-American Community Council was present to speak about the International Mother's Day Language Monument Proposal. As per Mr. Mujumder, in Bangladesh, people died to protect their language. "How would you feel if someone told you could not speak your language anymore?" This issue led to the independence of Bangladesh. International Mother Language Day was proclaimed by United Nations in 1999, February 21st is celebrated as International Mother Language Day even though it was established in Bangladesh. Mr. Mujumder is requesting installation of a symbol of International Mother's Day. He would like it on Union Port Rd in front of Chang Li Supermarket. Mr. Mujumder's presentation pledges to cover the expense of this installation and maintenance but is requesting the expedition of this request. On behalf of the Parks Dept, Patricia Ferguson will share this request with the Commissioner. There are a lot of different steps involved with this process. As per Chairman Himidan, also please note the 2013 timeframe on this request. The plaque will be in multi-language. The proposal is included in the packet that was distributed. The design is included in the packet as well. As per Chairman Himidian, it is essential to have as many languages that encompasses our district. Mr. Mujumder stated that other cities have already funded similar projects. As per Chairman Himidina, how do we go about getting a bench in a park in dedication of a person? Since Board Member Kadesha Washington was not in attendance, Parks Chair Jaime Feliberty opted to vote on suggestions for how to spend funding when BM Washington was present at the following meeting. Easter Egg Hunt may be an issue due to the time it takes to get Parks permits for events. As per Ms. Ferguson, if there's anything she can do to help expedite permits for events, she'd be willing to help. Since events are coming from committee they are welcomed. Chairman Himidian will follow-up with Parks Chair and Vice Chair on permits for possible Parks Committee Events in March or April. As per Joan Barnes, the Appreciation Breakfast for CB9 Park employees (around 30) was also an event that was discussed. As per Kevin Walker, Parks representative, a lunch would be most ideal and all employees will be invited to attend. As per Ms. Ferguson, Mr. Walker has been doing a phenomenal job and he is being recognized as well as the district by the City Parks Commissioner. As per Walter Nestler, just give us the name of the capital contractor. As per Ms. Ferguson, it's Ms. Michelle Martell or Michael Ortiz oversee capital contractors.

Subject: Request to place International Language Martyr Monument/Shaheed Minar in Parkchester, Bronx, to commemorate and observe International Mother Language Dday (IMLD)

I am writing this letter on behalf of all Bangladeshi-Americans living in this great city of New York, in order to place a International Language Martyr Monument/Shaheed Minar in the Parkchester area of the Bronx, commemorating International Mother Language Day.

Brief history of International Mother Language Day.

International Mother Language Day was proclaimed by the General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) in November 1999 (30C/62). On May 16, 2009, the United Nations General Assembly, in its resolution A/RES/61/266, called upon Member States, "to promote the preservation and protection of all languages used by peoples of the world". By the same resolution, the General Assembly proclaimed 2008 as the International Year of Languages, to promote unity in diversity and international understanding through multilingualism and multiculturalism. Language is the most powerful instruments in preserving and developing our heritage, both tangible and intangible. All moves to promote the dissemination of mother tongues will serve not only to encourage linguistic diversity and multilingual education, but also to develop

fuller awareness of linguistic and cultural traditions throughout the world, and to inspire solidarity based on understanding, tolerance and dialogue.

—from the United Nations International Mother Language

Historical Development of February 21- The International Mother Language Day

The history of the 21st of February, now known as International Mother Language Day, began with the independence of Pakistan from British colonial rule on the Indian subcontinent in 1947. Pakistan received independence in two parts, West Pakistan (present-day Pakistan) and East Pakistan (present-day Bangladesh) on the basis of religion. As the two parts were far away from each other, not only in land area, but also in lifestyle, language, environment, ethical values, and culture, it did not take too much time to create disputes between the two parts of the country. The problems worsened day by day, which augmented a conflict situation between the two provinces of East and West Pakistan. The most critical situation occurred when West Pakistan (present-day Pakistan) authority adopted a regulation that URDU would be the only state language in 1947 through a declaration in the Education Conference at Karachi. Most of the people were speakers of Bangla, and the people of East Pakistan were only accustomed to the Bangla language. It was also decided that Bangla would be abolished from all government stationary, including money order forms, envelopes, and posters that would be only be printed in Urdu and English even though East Pakistan constituted most of population and spoke Bangla.

Jinnah, the Pakistani Prime Minister at the time, said, "Let me make it very clear to you that the state language of Pakistan will be Urdu and no other language. Anyone who tries to mislead you is really the enemy of Pakistan. Without one language no nation can remain solidly lied together and function. Look at the history of other countries. Therefore, so far as the state language is concerned, Pakistan's shall be Urdu."

The problems grew again and extended even further in 1951. In 1952, the Prime Minister of Pakistan, Mr. Khawaja Nazimuddin, again reiterated the previous declaration that, "Urdu will be the state language of Pakistan," avoiding the feelings and extreme protests in East Pakistan. This rewind of the declaration created serious discontent amongst the Bengali population of East Pakistan, and a flame of protest spread over the country against the decision.

Final countdown for the Language Movement

People of East Pakistan (present-day Bangladesh), especially the students, were not ready to accept this decision. They argued that this decision is a total violation of democracy and a blatant indication that East Pakistan was not independent of West Pakistani authority as the government was responsible for snatching the mother tongue of 56% of the total population. They demanded that BANGLA should have the prestige and power as a state language along with URDU. The following statistics show how deep the disparity over this decision was:

The capital of the country was situated in West Pakistan, and the main city of East Pakistan was neglected. 80% of employees were from West Pakistan, mostly from Punjab, and only

2% represent West Pakistan in the Military Section. In the national budget, the disparity was so acute that it made it seem as if West Pakistan was King and East Pakistan was nothing but a beggar. Thus, a great historical plot was developed.

In response to the statement of The Prime Minister, politicians, along with the students, stood in a fiery position and the "All Party State Language Committee" was formed on January 31st, 1952 to protest the matter and to achieve the Honor and Prestige of The Mother Tongue again. A 16 member committee was held up. February 21st was chosen as the day for protesting since it was the scheduled time for the Budget Session of East Bengal. A whole day of strikes and procession was planned for that day. As it was expected, the Pakistani Government would not make this event smooth for the people of East Province, and they showed their ugly face again. On February 20th in the evening, the government imposed Section 144 in the city and banned any gathering or procession, even of five people. That evening the "All Party State Language Committee" met in an urgent meeting at the **Awami League** Premises, but it was tough to make a decision because the top two leaders, **Mowlana A.H.K Bhasani** was at Tangail (in his village home), and **Sheikh Mujibur Rahman** was jailed. The 16 committee members were not unanimous in order to break section 144, but later the decision was taken in a vote of 11 to 4 in favor of breaking section 144.

After making the decision to break 144 again, confusion arose as most of the top political leaders opposed the idea of the massive class with the use of armed forces. However, the students were so determined and full of patriotic spirit that it seemed no power in this world could prevent them from achieving their birth and civil rights. The next morning on February 21st, students of **Dhaka University Medical College**, Engineering University gathered at the Dhaka University premises and started protesting with the slogan, "We want Bangla as State Language" and "We don't obey section 144".

Finally Blood for Language

As time was passing, tension and fury was also rising. At mid-day, students remembered that the budget session was going to start at 3:00 PM, and they planned not to reach the minister in the assembly building. Students were gathering more and more, and before 3:00 PM, a large group of students broke out in a great procession. By this time, armed police were deployed in large numbers and District Magistrate Koreyshi commanded they open fire. The police complied and threw tire shells at the crowd. Consequently, a number of students were shot spot dead! February 21st took the permanent hue of red from that day. We lost our brothers. It is red to this date.

Thousands of students were injured and arrested also. Following the news of the death of the students, the situation was deteriorating and students called a full day strike on the following day February 22nd. On that day, some other rebels were also killed by the police. As the Great Language Movement was going on, the Bengali people finally achieved the right to use their mother tongue. Still today, we believe that the language movement not only gave us the right to speak our language, but also paved the way of liberation war in 1971.

Significance of International Language Martyrs Monument

The Language Movement is one of the most formidable movements which have come up in the country of Bangladesh, thus the Central Shahid Minar epitomizes efforts to represent the spirit of Bangladeshi nationalism and also highlight the importance of the Bengali language in the social and cultural progress of the country. As a result, the Shahid Minar has a very significant place in the social and cultural mechanism of Bangladesh.

Furthermore, there are several language movements happened throughout the world during the 19^{th} and 20^{th} century. Followings are some of the example. The International monument in the Bronx will recognize all martyrs in this part of the Great Melting Pot, the New York City.

- Baloch independence movement, a movement that claims the Baloch people, an ethno-linguistic group mainly found in Pakistan, Iran and Afghanistan, are a distinct nation,
- English-only movement, a political movement to use English as the only language in official government operations in the United States of America
- Gaelic revival, the late-nineteenth-century national revival of interest in the Irish language and Irish Gaelic culture
- Language Freedom Movement, an organization opposing the state-sponsored revival of the Irish language
- Illyrian movement, a pan-South-Slavist cultural and political campaign during the first half of the 19th century
- Kosli language movement, a campaign for recognition for the Kosli language
- Khowar Language Movement, a linguistic movement in Pakistan aimed at reviving the Khowar Chitrali language
- Nepal Bhasa movement, a movement for linguistic rights of Nepal Bhasa speakers in Nepal
- Norwegian language conflict, an ongoing controversy within Norwegian culture and politics related to spoken and written Norwegian
- Punjabi Language Movement, a linguistic movement in Punjab, Pakistan aimed at reviving Punjabi language, art, and culture
- Rajasthani language movement, a campaign for greater recognition for the Rajasthani language
- Reintegrationism, a linguistic and cultural movement in Galicia which views Galician and Portuguese as a single language
- Scandinavian movement, literary and political movements that support various degrees of cooperation among the Scandinavian or Nordic countries
- Urdu movement, a socio-political movement aimed at making Urdu the universal language and symbol of the cultural and political identity of the Muslim communities of the Indian subcontinent

At present, all national, mourning, cultural, and other activities held each year, regarding February 21st, have been centered on the Shahid Minar / Martyrs Monument.

Bangladeshis in Parkchester

The Bangladeshi population is growing very fast in the five boroughs of New York City, particularly in the Parkchester area of the Bronx, which is under Community Board 9. Many Bangladeshi immigrants have been coming and settling in Parkchester. According to the census data of 2010, there are more than 12,600 Asians Americans residing in Parkchester. The Asian population in Parkchester is mostly made up of Bangladeshis. Since most of those people are of Bangladeshi origin, it is clear that the census concerning the Asian population is mainly in regards to the Bangladeshis. The growth of this population, between the period of 2000 and 2010, is 500%, and continuing to grow.

Bangladeshi people have at least seven Mosques (Muslims place of worship) and two Mandirs (Hindu's place of worship) in the Parkchester area. There are many stores, restaurants, barbers, contractors, professional services and medical offices, such as doctors, lawyers, dentists, and accountants of Bangladeshi origin that are concentrated in the Parkchester area. Many social and cultural organizations work within the community. Bangladeshi-Americans are the most vibrant and the fastest growing community in the Bronx. Most importantly, they are very politically conscious and participate in the political process. 99% of Bangladeshi-American voted in the last presidential election. Bangladeshi Americans have been playing a vital role in this city's economy and political process.

With that said, it would very much please the Bengali-American community of Parkchester, Castle Hill, and Sound View if a permanent Martyr Monument/Shahid Minar was erected in honor of those who sacrificed their lives fighting for the mother language throughout the world. Not only would Bengali-Americans love that a monument was erected in their honor, but so would the millions of people still living in Bangladesh who have never had the opportunity to visit this area of the world. The monument would commemorate International Mother Language Day and those who fought for their right to speak their mother tongue, showing that the people of Bangladesh and linguists around the world have strong ties to America, an oasis of the free world where no one can be discriminated against for expressing and respecting their mother tongue.



The enormous design will include a circular column to symbolize the mother with her fallen sons standing on the monument's central dais. Yellow and deep blue pieces of glass will symbolize eyes reflecting the sun, would also be placed in the columns. The marble floor will be designed to reflect the moving shadows of the columns. The basement of the Minar will also include 300-square-foot resco depicting the history of the language movement. A railing decorated with the Bengali alphabet is to be constructed in front. Two footmarks colored red and black, indicating the two opposite forces, are also in the design. Elected officials and

members of the monument commission's name will be included on the base. Actual size will be determined by the commission.



Use plan: From the street there will be a safe paved pathway to the monument to place flowers and to exit through the exit door after placing the flower on the monument on the day of celebration.



GWB remarks to the Bronx CB#9 Public Safety and Transportation Committee, 2/1/18

Between 2017 and 2024, the Port Authority will rip out and restore the 1931-era paths on the George Washington Bridge as part of a \$1.9 billion recabling and restoration project.

The GWB is the sole bike-able connector between North Jersey and New York City and the nexus of the 1650 mile Tri-State Trail Network. Its 7 foot paths are now dangerously overcrowded at 3700 cyclists per day on weekends and growing 10% per year. If this continues, that's 9000 cyclists per day by 2024. There's no precedent for crowding so many cyclists onto such a narrow path, yet this is the PA's plan.

If not widened to national standards (AASHTO), it will become a "walk-your-bikes" facility. This will hobble the growth of cycling across the region for generations, impacting affordability, public health, tourism, sustainability and resilience annually worth hundreds of millions of dollars.

Conversely, GWB paths widened to support growing demand would spur construction of a connected grid and the expansion of bike share across Harlem River bridges. This in turn:

- Creates new commuting options across the Bronx's "transportation deserts," reducing congestion and demand on overcrowded buses. Everyone who bikes frees up capacity for those who don't.
- Expands resident access to employment and education and increases affordability. Bike commuting saves thousands of dollars per year vs. mass transit or commuting by car.
- Extends community access to green space throughout the Bronx, into Westchester and Connecticut and across the Hudson River, encouraging residents of all ages to exercise.



- Models by World Health Organization and Columbia School for Public Health show investment in cycling infrastructure to be incredibly cost effective public health interventions. Encouraging cycling enhances physical fitness and mental health while lowering the incidence of diabetes and asthma.
- Bike trips offset twice the CO2 as low emission vehicles.
- New York is spending \$500 million to expand recreational cycling on the New Tappan Zee Bridge and Empire State Trail. Extending that network through the Bronx will route the region's cyclists past local tourist and food shops.
- People who bike are more likely to shop locally. Bike shops by their nature are labor intensive and community oriented.
- Cyclists provide resilience during transport outages. In 2019, when the "L" subway the shut down to make repairs to the Canarsie Tubes, bike traffic across the Williamsburg Bridge is expected to double to 1400 trips per hour.
- Robust cycling infrastructure enhances CB9's attractiveness to a younger demographic.
- 230 organizations, businesses and communities have called on the Port Authority to widen the GWB paths, including Manhattan CBs #4, 7, 9, 12 and Bronx CBs #4, 5, 7, 8 and Rep. Serrano.

BOROUGH PRESIDENT DIAZ RE: Mayor de Blasio's Plan to Replace NYCHA Boilers

"Mayor de Blasio's announcement today is cold comfort for the tenants of NYCHA, as it does nothing to accelerate the timeline of the procurement process. Even on the most optimistic schedule the city will have a different mayor when these new boiler installations are completed.

"We cannot afford to wait any longer to make critical, long overdue repairs. NYCHA must issue an emergency declaration and take the necessary steps to cut through the red tape of the procurement process and replace broken boilers faster. This heat crisis is a dire health emergency, and it requires an immediate, permanent solution," said **Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr.**

OVER 50 ELECTEDS JOIN BP DIAZ & CALL ON NYCHA TO ISSUE EMERGENCY DECLARATION ON HEAT CRISIS

Over 50 elected officials from all over the five boroughs are calling on the New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA) to issue an emergency declaration to address the dangerous lack of heat and hot water in many developments across the city, in order to speed the procurement process to replace out of service boilers.

"As a progressive city, we have a requirement to protect our most vulnerable residents. The hundreds of thousands of individuals and families who call public housing home should not be forced to suffer in the cold. An emergency declaration would allow your agency to jump-start the procurement process and install much-needed, permanent boilers that are already in the pipeline at a swifter pace," states the letter, which is addressed to NYCHA Chair and CEO Shola Olatoye.

"A declaration of emergency is a common sense act NYCHA can take to streamline the procurement process, and it is heartening to see that so many of my colleagues from across the five boroughs agree. Clearly, the signatories on this letter understand the urgency to act immediately on behalf of the more than 400,000 tenants who call NYCHA home," said **Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr.**, who first called on the agency to declare an emergency in a letter sent last month. "And if some aspect of City, State or Federal law hinders the process, it is incumbent upon City Hall, with all its resources at its disposal, to take action and build coalitions for change, not to throw up its hands."

TESTIMONY OF BRONX BOROUGH PRESIDENT RUBEN DIAZ JR. BEFORE THE NYC COUNCIL COMMITTEES ON PUBLIC HOUSING AND OVERSIGHT AND INVESTIGATION RE: NYCHA HEAT AND HOT WATER FAILURES

The recent "bomb cyclone" that struck the northeast region caused dangerous drops in temperatures across the five boroughs. Nowhere was this extreme weather event felt more dramatically than within NYCHA developments, where nearly half of all boilers are beyond their useful life and many developments are forced to rely on ineffective temporary boilers to provide heat and hot water.

The hundreds of thousands of individuals and families who call public housing home should not be forced to suffer in the cold. Our office has received numerous complaints from residents of NYCHA developments across the borough. When seeking answers on when new boilers would be installed NYCHA advised my office in a meeting on January 18, 2018, that their hands were tied by the procurement process, contrary to recent statements by City Hall. That is no comfort to a family forced to live in a frigid apartment on the coldest days of the year.

I know that the chronic lack of heat and hot water in NYCHA housing is an emergency. Formally declaring a state of emergency is a common sense act and the morally correct action NYCHA can take to streamline the procurement process. Such a declaration would allow your agency to jump-start the procurement process and install much-needed, permanent boilers that are already in the pipeline at a swifter pace.

Further, if some aspect of Federal law hinders the emergency procurement process, it is incumbent upon City Hall, with all its resources at its disposal, to take action and build coalitions for change, not to throw up its hands.

The process to replace boilers in NYCHA developments takes far too long, and does not reflect the urgent need for these critical repairs. For example, the Patterson Houses in The Bronx have been forced to subsist using inadequate temporary boilers since 2011. NYCHA has not even begun the RFP process to replace these boilers, which means that even in a best-case scenario new boilers will be years away. The recent extreme weather event showed us just how vulnerable temporary boilers are to very low temperatures, and we have no reason not to expect similar extreme weather

in the future. NYCHA tenants should not have to wait a decade for the basic human right of reliable heat and hot water.

We must act to cut red tape during this time of severe crisis. While the recent announcement of some new funding for boilers is a step in the right direction, the situation remains an emergency, and NYCHA has told our office that red tape ties their hands. An emergency must be declared.

We would not accept this kind of behavior from a private landlord. NYCHA tenants are entitled to warm apartments, just like anyone else.

Treating this situation as the true disaster it is will help provide heat to families faster, and your agency should declare an emergency immediately and show leadership in cutting the red tape at any and all levels of government, that NYCHA has stated deprives residents of adequate heat.

BOROUGH PRESIDENT DIAZ OUTLINES HOUSING UNITS FOR PRESERVATION IN REPORT ON JEROME AVENUE CORRIDOR REZONING

Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. has issued a report identifying more than 2,000 units of affordable housing that must be preserved as part of the proposed rezoning of the Jerome Avenue corridor.

The report, titled "Zoned-In: A Housing Preservation Blueprint for the Jerome Avenue Corridor," identifies 2,075 units across 45 buildings within a ¼ mile radius of the area proposed for rezoning around Jerome Avenue by the de Blasio administration.

"In my negotiations with the administration as part of the ULURP process, the city committed to preserving 1,500 units of affordable housing in Community Boards #4 and #5, as a condition of my support of this rezoning. While this achievement is appreciated, we can do more to keep this community affordable. This report identifies the units that should be preserved and kept affordable, and the city should direct its resources to do just that," said **Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr.** "As this rezoning proposal moves forward, it will be up to the City Council to hold the administration to the promises they have made."

The report uses a formula based on building violations, demographics and development subsidies to identify units that meet the criteria for further preservation. It can be read in full at http://on.nyc.gov/2ErFy7t.

"Though I have been a critic of congestion pricing in the past and still remain skeptical, the plan released today by Governor Cuomo and his Fix NYC panel offers a wide variety of innovative suggestions on how we can raise funds and reduce congestion in Manhattan, and is fairer and less regressive than simply tolling the East River bridges. However, the burdens of this new proposal must be examined carefully.

"If a congestion pricing proposal is implemented in Manhattan, the funds raised must be earmarked to repair our city's subway system by establishing a dedicated fund for New York City Transit. I look forward to further examining this proposal in the coming months," said **Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr.**


