- b. Para Transit Unit, Metropolitan Transit Authority (MTA)
 - i. Para Transit customer use increased significantly during the pandemic
 - ii. Para Transit website is: new.mta.info/accessibility/paratransit; You can complete the following tasks:
 - 1. Create an account
 - 2. Schedule rides
 - 3. File complaints
 - 4. Review ridership and performance stats

IV. Old Business

- a. Lefferts Avenue (Bedford/Washington Avenues) Speed Hump Request
 - i. Previously approved and never installed
 - ii. Subsequent requests disapproved
 - iii. Speed camera installed instead of speed reducer
 - iv. Each block North (Sterling), South (Lincoln) and East (Lefferts between Bedford and Rogers) have speed bumps. Note: fire trucks routinely use Lincoln Road, which has speed bumps, during emergencies. So why is Lefferts unsuitable
 - v. There are 4 large apartment buildings on the south side of this block, each with 100 or so units coupled with the single-family homes on the north side of the street. This level of population density necessitates a calmer block
 - vi. The driveways from the single-family homes are impeded by speeding drivers this is a major safety hazard when cars enter or exit their own homes.
 - vii. Subsequent segments of Lefferts Avenue have speed reducers, with New York/Nostrand being recently approved
- b. Lincoln Road Block Association ASP Reduction Request
 - Per the information provided to the Committee Chair and CB9 District Manager by DSNY, this request should be presented to the Environmental Protection Committee
 - 1. The DSNY score card for the district would have to be over 90% for two consecutive fiscal years.
 - 2. The recommendation would have to be voted on and approved to be reviewed by the Full Board
 - 3. The Full Board would then vote to approve holding a public hearing for the request
 - 4. Notice would have to be provided to local elected officials, utility companies, etc.
