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Executive Director's Monthly Report November 2024 (Statistics for October 2024)

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Executive Summary

The Civilian Complaint Review Board ("CCRB") is an independent municipal Agency that investigates complaints of NYPD misconduct. Every month, the CCRB prepares an Executive Director report for its public meeting. Data for October 2024 included the following highlights:

- 1) Of the cases in the CCRB active investigations docket, 50% have been open for 4 months or fewer, and 65% have been open for 7 months or fewer (page 10). In October, the CCRB opened 516 new cases (page 4), and currently has a total open docket of 3,498 cases (page 11).
- 2) The CCRB substantiated allegations in 44% of its fully investigated cases in October (page 17).
- 3) The CCRB fully investigated 34% of the cases it closed in October (page 14).
- 4) For October, investigations using video evidence resulted in substantiated allegations in 47% of cases compared to 19% of cases in which video was not available (page 24).
- 5) The Monthly Report includes a breakdown of complaints and substantiations by NYPD precinct and borough of occurrence (pages 5-6, 26-35).
- 6) In October the Police Commissioner finalized 23 decision(s) against police officers in Administrative Prosecution Unit (APU) cases (page 40). The CCRB's APU prosecutes the most serious allegations of misconduct. The APU conducted 43 trials against members of the NYPD year-to-date; 1 trial was conducted against respondent officers in October.

The CCRB is committed to producing monthly reports that are valuable to the public, and welcomes feedback on how to make its data more accessible.

Glossary

In this glossary we have included a list of terms that regularly appear in our reports.

Allegation: An allegation is a specific act of misconduct. The same "complaint" can have multiple allegations – excessive force and discourteous language, for example. Each allegation is reviewed separately during an investigation.

APU: The Administrative Prosecution Unit is the division of the CCRB that has prosecuted "charges" cases since April 2013, after the signing of a 2012 Memorandum of Understanding between the CCRB and NYPD.

Board Panel: The "Board" of the CCRB has 15 members. Following a completed investigation by the CCRB staff, three Board members, sitting as a Board Panel, will make a finding on whether misconduct occurred and will make a recommendation on what level of penalty should follow.

Case/Complaint: For the purposes of CCRB data, a "case" or "complaint" is defined as any incident within the Agency's jurisdiction, brought to resolution by the CCRB.

Disposition: The Board's finding as to the outcome of a case (i.e. if misconduct occurred).

FADO: Under the City Charter, the CCRB has jurisdiction to investigate the following categories of police misconduct: Force, Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy and Offensive Language, collectively known as "FADO".

FADO&U: A ballot measure revising the New York City Charter, which passed on November 5, 2019, authorized the CCRB to investigate the truthfulness of an official statement made by a subject officer during a CCRB investigation into a FADO allegation. This expanded jurisdiction—Force, Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy, Offensive Language, and Untruthful Statements (FADO&U)—went into effect on March 31, 2020.

Intake: CCRB's intake team initially handles complaints from the public. Intake takes complaints that come via live phone calls, voicemails, an online complaint form, or in-person.

Investigation: CCRB investigators gather evidence and interview witnesses to prepare reports on misconduct allegations. An investigation ends when a closing report is prepared detailing the evidence and legal analysis, and the case is given to the Board for disposition.

Mediation: A complainant may mediate his or her case with the subject officer, in lieu of an investigation, with the CCRB providing a neutral, third-party mediator.

Unable to Investigate: A catch-all term, used for reporting purposes only, that refers to cases where the CCRB was unable to conduct an investigation, typically because no statement could be obtained from the complainant/alleged victim. "Unable to Investigate" incorporates the following CCRB dispositions: "Complainant/Alleged Victim Uncooperative", "Complainant/Alleged Victim Unavailable", "Witness Uncooperative", "Witness Unavailable", "Victim Unidentified", "OMB PEG Directive Closure", and "SRAD Closure."

Withdrawn: When the complainant/alleged victim asks that their complaint be withdrawn, the case is closed as "Withdrawn."

Closed Pending Litigation: When a complainant is involved in criminal or civil litigation, and declines to cooperate with an investigation on the advice of their attorney, the complaint disposition is "Closed Pending Litigation."

Complaints Received





Figure 3: New CCRB Complaints by Year (YTD 2010 - YTD 2024)

The CCRB's Intake team processes misconduct complaints from the public and referrals from the NYPD. Under the New York City Charter, the CCRB's jurisdiction is limited to allegations of misconduct related to Force, Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy and Offensive Language. All other complaints are referred to the appropriate agency. Figure 1 refers to all complaints that the CCRB receives and Figures 2 and 3 refer to new cases that remain with the Agency. In October 2024, the CCRB initiated 516 new complaints.

Figure 1: Total Intake by Month (January 2023 - October 2024)

Figure 4: CCRB Complaints Received By Borough of Occurrence (October 2024)




Figure 5: CCRB Complaints Received By Borough of Occurrence (YTD 2024)




Figure 6: CCRB Complaints Received By Precinct of Occurrence (October 2024)




Figure 9: CCRB Complaints Received By Type of Allegation (YTD 2023 vs. YTD 2024)

Figure 15: Number of Active Investigations (January 2023 - October 2024)




Figure 16: Open Docket Analysis




Figure 17: Open Docket Analysis with % Change

Body Worn Camera Footage Requests

Since the widespread roll out of body worn cameras in 2018, the collection of footage from these cameras has become an integral part of CCRB investigations.

The timeliness of the response to BWC footage requests has a direct impact on the length of time it takes to complete an investigation. The longer it takes to fulfill BWC requests, the longer CCRB investigations remain on the open docket.

Figure 20: Percentage of Open Investigations Docket with Pending BWC Requests (January 2023 - October 2024)





Figure 21: Fulfilled BWC Requests (January 2023 - October 2024)

Dispositions

Cases fully investigated by the CCRB generally receive one of five outcomes:

- If the alleged misconduct is found to have occurred, based on the preponderance of the evidence, the allegation is closed as **substantiated**.
- If there is not enough evidence to determine whether or not the alleged misconduct occurred, the allegation is closed as **unable to determine**.*
- If the preponderance of the evidence suggests that the event or alleged act did not occur, the allegation is closed as **unfounded**.
- If the event did occur, but was not improper by a preponderance of evidence, the allegation is closed as within NYPD guidelines.**
- If the CCRB was unable to identify any of the officers accused of misconduct, the case is closed as **officer unidentified**.

Case Abstracts

The following case abstracts are taken from complaints closed this month and serve as examples of what the different CCRB dispositions mean in practice:

1. Substantiated

An individual stated that she evaded paying a subway fare by jumping over a turnstile. She was approached by an officer who asked for her ID and the individual stated that she could provide it verbally as she did not have her ID with her. The officer walked away, and the individual walked towards the exit gate. She was then approached once again by the officer and the subject officer. The subject officer engaged in a dialogue with the individual and told her that she was trespassing. The subject officer told the individual to leave and she refused. A physical altercation ensured and the individual resisted being handcuffed; the subject officer tased her on the left side of her stomach. The incident was captured on BWC. It showed the subject officer telling the individual to leave and her refusing to do so as she held onto the exit gate. It showed the subject officer telling the individual that he would tase her as other officers struggle to handcuff her; it showed that the subject officer tased the individual. The subject officer admitted to deploying his taser twice, the second one with tongs deployed into the individual vas being handcuffed and was only passively resisting, a circumstance under which a taser cannot be used. The Board substantiated the Use of Force allegation.

2. Unable to Determine

An individual called a precinct to inquire about a 311 complaint that had been closed without any police corrective action. The subject officer answered and did not identify herself. The individual asked about the complaint and the subject officer appeared to be engaged in conversation outside of the phone call which caused the individual to feel ignored. He tried to regain the subject officer's attention, and she replied, "you're not going to fucking talk to me like that and get your shit together" and hung up the phone. The individual called the precinct back and a different officer answered the phone was able to identify the subject officer to the individual. The subject officer stated that she explained to the individual the police action taken regarding the 311 complaint. She stated that the individual was yelling and being irate over the phone and that the individual was the one to hang up the phone. Without any independent witnesses or additional audio footage, the investigation could not determine if the subject officer cursed at the individual or hung up the phone on him. The Board closed the Discourtesy allegations as Unable to Determine.

3. Unfounded

An individual went to a precinct to amend a police report. At the precinct, the individual spoke to an officer about the report and as they were speaking, they were approached by another officer and the subject officer. The officer that accompanied the subject officer left and the subject officer began to dispute with the individual details about the report. The individual told the first officer that she wanted to speak to a supervisor about the subject officer's attitude towards her and the subject officer interrupted the individual and threatened to arrest her for trespassing. The incident was captured on a precinct camera. It showed the individual in the civilian waiting area talking to the first officer and being approached by the subject officer and another officer. It showed the individual talking to the subject officer who tells her that she can't make a report for items that were not taken. The individual stated to the first officer that the subject officer was being "antagonistic", and the subject officer walked towards the exit door of the waiting area. He then turned around and told the individual "If you don't leave in five minutes, you're trespassing." He never mentions arresting the individual. The Board closed the Abuse of Authority allegation as Unfounded.

4. Within NYPD Guidelines

An individual was home when two subject officers came to her home. They told her that their supervisor had instructed them to enter her home, and she believed that she had to consent to their entry, so she let them in. The incident was captured on BWC. It showed the subject officers with the individual outside of her apartment door discussing the reason for their visit. The individual began to ask if they wanted to come in and the subject officers ask her consent to enter her home. The individual verbally gave consent for them to enter and opened the apartment door and held it open. The individual also told CCRB investigators that she had would have denied the subject officers' entry if she had felt nervous. CCRB investigators also confirmed that the individual had described a subject officer that was not one of the officers that sought consent to enter her home. The investigation found that the subject officers had sought and received consent from the individual before entering her home. The Board closed the Abuse of Authority allegations as being Within NYPD Guidelines.

5. Officer Unidentified

An individual stated that he was having an issue with a MetroCard machine, so he spoke to an MTA clerk. Two uniformed officers were in his way, and he told them move out of his way, but they refused. The individual asked for their names, shield numbers, and business cards and they ignored him. One of the officers called the individual a "bum" and used other profanities. The individual was able to provide a general description of the officers. The investigation reviewed MTA video surveillance footage but none of the videos captured the incident. Two MTA employees were listed as working on the incident date but neither recalled the incident nor interacting with anyone matching the individual's description. Finally, the investigation checked the nearby precinct and found 19 officers matching the general description that the individual gave – none of the officers' memo book entries placed them at the incident location. Without additional pertinent information, the investigation could not identify the subject officers. The Board closed the Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy, and Offensive Language allegations as Officer Unidentified.

^{*} Unable to determine is reported to the Commissioner as Unsubstantiated, meaning that there was insufficient evidence to establish whether or not there was an act of misconduct.

^{**} Within NYPD Guidelines is reported to the Commissioner as Exonerated, meaning there was a preponderance of the evidence that the acts alleged occurred but did not constitute misconduct.

Figure 23: Disposition Counts of Full Investigations (October 2024)





Figure 24: Disposition Counts of Full Investigations (YTD 2024)

Dispositions - Untruthful Statement Allegations

Following the 2019 passage of Ballot Question #2 and the subsequent City Charter Revision, CCRB's jurisdiction was expanded to include untruthful material statements made by police officers. As a result, CCRB added a new "Untruthful Statement" category of allegations.

There are four specific allegations in the new "Untruthful Statement" category: 1) False official statement, 2) Misleading official statement, 3) Inaccurate official statement and 4) Impeding an investigation.

The Racial Profiling and Bias Based Policing ("RPBP") Unit is a unit at the CCRB focused on investigating civilian complaints of profiling/biased policing by uniformed (not civilian) members of the NYPD based on 10 different protected categories: race, national origin/ethnicity, color, religion, age, immigration or citizenship status, gender/gender identity, sexual orientation, disability, and housing status.

Figure 33: Percentage of Cases Substantiated (January 2023 - October 2024)





Figure 34: Disposition of Substantiated Complaints* (2024)

Figure 35: Substantiation Rates for Full Investigations without Video (Jan 2023 - Oct 2024) (% substantiated shown)





Figure 36: Substantiation Rates for Full Investigations with Video (Jan 2023 - Oct 2024) (% substantiated shown)



Board Discipline Recommendations for Substantiated Officers

After a CCRB investigative team has completed its investigation, a panel of Board members determines whether to substantiate the allegation(s) and make a disciplinary recommendation against the officer(s).

- "Charges and Specifications" are the most severe form of discipline. A decision to assign
 Charges commences a process that may result in an administrative trial in the NYPD Trial
 Room. An officer may lose vacation days, be suspended, or be terminated if the officer is
 found guilty.
- "Command Discipline B" and "Command Discipline A" are recommended for misconduct that is moderately serious. An officer can lose up to ten vacation days as a result of Command Discipline B and up to five vacation days as a result of Command Discipline A.
- "Formalized Training" are the least severe discipline, often recommended for officers who misunderstand a policy. This determination results in training at the Police Academy or NYPD Legal Bureau (Formalized Training).
- When the Board has recommended Formalized Training or Command Discipline, the case is sent to the NYPD Commissioner to impose training and/or other penalties. Cases where the Board recommends charges are prosecuted by the CCRB's Administrative Prosecution Unit.

Under the New York City Charter, the Police Commissioner makes the final decision regarding discipline and the outcome of disciplinary trials. When the Police Commissioner issues the discipline recommended by the CCRB, we report it as discipline concurrence.
