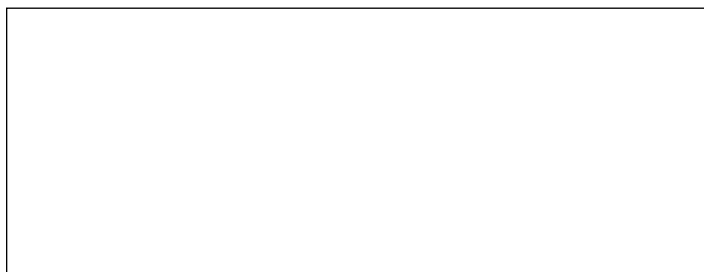

1) Flatbush Avenue BID Expansion (N 230160BDK)

An application by the Department of Small Businesses Services (SBS), pursuant to Section 25405(a) of Chapter 4, Title 25 of the New York City administrative code to expand and amend the Flatbush Avenue Business Improvement District (BID) in Brooklyn community districts 9 and 14 (CDs 9 and 14).

2) Paperific Rezoning (220470 ZMK, 220471 ZRK, 220472 ZSK)

An application by Paperific Supermarket, pursuant to sections 197-c and 201 of the New York City Charter affecting 25 tax lots (of which four are applicant-owned) fronting the west side of 15th Avenue, as well as 37th and 38th streets. The applicant seeks a zoning map amendment to change the project area from M1-2, M2-1, and R6 to C4-4A and R6B districts, a zoning text amendment to establish a coterminous Mandatory Inclusionary Housing (MIH) area, and a special permit, pursuant to ZR Section 74-681 to allow development over a right-of-way where elevated transit service has been discontinued. These actions would enable a five-story, 103,512 square-foot building with a 19,985 square-foot ground-floor supermarket and commercial office uses above, at 1459 38th Street in Brooklyn Community District 12 (CD 12). The building's cellar would contain 63 vehicular parking spaces accessible via 37th Street.

Located partially within Subarea C and partially within M1-5 Districts**

For #zoning lots# existing prior to June 23, 2005, and located partially within an M1-5 District and partially within a C6-3 District in Subarea C, the permitted #floor area ratio# for the C6-3 District portion of the #zoning lot# may be increased, to the #floor area ratio# existing in the C6-3 District portion on June 23, 2005, up to a maximum #floor area ratio# of 7.5, provided that the Chairperson of the City Planning Commission has certified that a payment has been made, to the #High Line# Improvement Fund, established under Section 98-25, to be used, at the discretion of the Chairperson to assure that the #High Line#

is restored and reused as a public accessible open space. The amount of such contribution shall be determined in the manner prescribed in Section 98-35 (High Line Transfer Corridor Bonus). No building permit for any #development# or #enlargement# may be issued for any #building or other structure# on the #zoning lot# that will contain #floor area# made available, to the #zoning lot# as a result of the application of this Section unless and until such certification has been made.

98-423 Street wall location, minimum and maximum base heights and maximum building heights

The provisions set forth in paragraph (a) of this Section shall apply to all #buildings or other structures#. Such provisions are modified for certain subareas as set forth in paragraphs (b) through (h) of this Section.

(a) For all #buildings#

(1) #Street wall# location provisions

On #wide streets#, and on #narrow streets# within 50 feet of their intersection with a #wide street#, the #street wall# shall be located on the #street line# and extend along such entire #street# frontage of the #zoning lot# up to, at least the minimum base height specified in the table in this Section. On #narrow street# frontages, beyond 50 feet of their intersection with a #wide street#, the #street wall# shall be located on the #street line# and extend along, at least 70 percent of the #narrow street# frontage of the #zoning lot# up to, at least the minimum base height specified in the table in this Section.

Where #street walls# are required to be located on the #street line#, recesses, not to exceed three feet in depth from the #street line#, shall be permitted on the ground floor where required, to provide access, to the #building#. Above a height of 12 feet, up to 30 percent of the #aggregate width of street walls# may be recessed beyond the #street line#, provided any such recesses deeper than 10 feet along a #wide street#, or 15 feet along a #narrow street#, are located within an #outer court#. Furthermore, no recesses shall be permitted within 30 feet of the intersection of two #street lines# except that, to allow articulation of #street walls#, at the intersection of two #street lines#, the #street wall# may be located anywhere within an area, bounded by the two #street lines# and a line connecting such #street lines#, at points 15 feet from their intersection.

For #developments# that occupy the entire #block# frontage of a #street# and provide a continuous sidewalk widening along such #street line#, the boundary of the sidewalk widening shall be considered to be the #street line# for the purposes of this Section.

The #street wall# location provisions of this Section shall not apply along that portion of any #street# frontage:

- (i) over which the #High Line# passes;
- (ii) occupied by existing #buildings# to remain, unless such #buildings# are vertically #enlarged#; or
- (iii) between the #High Line# and a #side lot line#, where such frontage measures less than 20 feet.

(2) Maximum #building# heights

(i) For C6-2A and C6-3A Districts

In C6-2A and C6-3A Districts, the maximum base height, maximum #building# height and the maximum number of #stories# shall be as set forth in Section 23-662 (Maximum height of buildings and setback regulations) for the residential equivalent of an R8A and R9A District, respectively. For #buildings# meeting the criteria set forth in paragraph (a) of Section 23-664 (Modified height and setback regulations for certain Inclusionary Housing buildings or affordable independent residences for seniors), such maximum heights and number of #stories# may be modified in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (b) of Section 23-664 for such districts' applicable residential equivalent. Separate maximum #building# heights are

set forth within such Sections for #Quality Housing buildings# with #qualifying ground floors# and for those with #non-qualifying ground floors#.

(ii) For all other districts

All portions of #buildings or other structures# that exceed the applicable maximum base height specified in the table in this Section shall provide a setback, at a height not lower than the applicable minimum base height. A setback with a depth of, at least 10 feet shall be provided from any #street wall# fronting on a #wide street#, and a setback with a depth of, at least 15 feet shall be provided from any #street wall# fronting on a #narrow street#, except such dimensions may include the depth of permitted recesses in the #street wall#.

No #building or other structure# shall exceed the maximum #building# height specified in the table in this Section.

* * *

(c) Subareas C, F and G

In Subareas C, F and G, for #zoning lots# with #wide# and #narrow street# frontage, no #street wall# is required beyond 50 feet of a #wide street#. Furthermore, for any #development# or #enlargement# that occupies, at least one corner of the Tenth Avenue #block# front and extends along the Tenth Avenue frontage of the #zoning lot# for, at least 170 feet, exclusive of existing #buildings# to remain, a lowered #street wall# shall be provided for any #building# that exceeds 45 feet in height. Such lowered #street wall# shall have a maximum height of 45 feet and a minimum height of 35 feet and extend along the Tenth Avenue frontage for a width not less than 25 percent and not more than 30 percent of the #aggregate width of street walls# facing Tenth Avenue. Such lowered #street wall# portion of the Tenth Avenue frontage shall be located, at the intersection of Tenth Avenue and a #narrow street#. Such lowered #street wall# shall extend along such #narrow# #street line# for a distance of, at least 50 feet from Tenth Avenue. Beyond 50 feet of Tenth Avenue, excluding the #High Line frontage# of a #building#, such portion of the #building# shall not exceed a height of 45 feet.

The provisions of this Section, relating to the location and height of the lowered #street wall# portion of the Tenth Avenue frontage of a #building# are illustrated in Diagram 1 (Street Wall and High Line Frontage Regulations in Subareas C, F and G) in Appendix C of this Chapter.

In Subarea C, for #zoning lots# with Tenth Avenue frontage between West 24th Street and West 28th Street, the maximum #building# height shall be 125 feet.

In Subarea C, for any #enlargement# on a #zoning lot# that is subject to the provisions of Section 98-242 (Located partially within Subarea C and partially within M1-5 Districts) and located in a Historic District designated by the Landmarks Preservation Commission, the minimum base height shall be the height of the existing #street wall# of the #building# to be #enlarged# and no #street wall# shall be required above such minimum base height.

The Department of Environmental Protection (“DEP”) is proposing to amend the Air Code Penalty Schedule, set forth in Chapter 43 of Title 15 of the Rules of the City of New York, in regard to changing and clarifying the criteria for second and third offenses of certain violations, including vehicular idling violations, and to provide that such violations can be admitted without going through the stipulation process.

What authorizes the Department to make these rules? Sections 1403(c) of the New York City Charter (“Charter”) and sections 24-105, 24-163, and 24-178 of the Administrative Code of the City of New York authorize DEP to make these proposed rules. These proposed rules were included in DEP’s regulatory agenda for this Fiscal Year.

Where can I find DEP’s rules? DEP’s rules are in Title 15 of the Rules of the City of New York.

What laws govern the rulemaking process? DEP must meet the requirements of Section 1043 of the Charter when creating or changing rules. This notice is made according to the requirements of Section 1043(b) of the Charter.

Statement of Basis and Purpose

Chapter 43 of Title 15 of the Rules of the City of New York sets forth the penalties that may be imposed for violations of the Air Pollution Control Code. Section one of this proposed rule would amend subdivision (5) of section 43-01 of title 15 of the Rules of the City of New York to revise the existing policy providing the time period following a predicate offense in which subsequent offenses may be considered second or third offenses for idling summonses and trigger potentially heightened penalties. Currently, this rule provision differentiates between all Air Pollution Control Code offenses and offenses of section 24-163 of the Administrative Code of the City of New York (“Administrative Code”), which prohibits excessive vehicle idling.

The Citizens Idling Complaint Program, authorized by section 24-182 of the Administrative Code, has caused a significant increase in the number of summonses being issued for violations of section 24-163 of the Administrative Code. This increase has resulted in delays in the issuance of summonses, meaning that much of the existing two-year period may expire while an initial summons is being issued and adjudicated. In order to address this issue, this proposed rule would increase the time period following the date of a predicate first offense of section 24-163 of the Administrative Code during which a subsequent offense can be treated as a second or third offense from two years to three.

This proposed rule amendment would also clarify that this time period policy applies to third offenses for Air Pollution Control Code offenses not related to section 24-163 of the Administrative Code, but would not amend the applicable two year period relating to such penalties.

Consistent with Chapter 6 of title 48 of the Rules of the City of New York, sections two and three of the proposed rule would add a new subdivision (7) to section 43-01 of title 15 of the Rules of the City of New York and amend the schedule set forth in section 43-02 of such title to provide that respondents may admit violations of section 24-163 instead of entering into a stipulation. Currently, the Department of Environmental Protection (“DEP”) makes a stipulation offer on many Air Code violations, in accordance with section 24-183 of the Administrative Code. Acceptance of the stipulation offer entails admitting the violation, paying the stipulated penalty, and promising to correct the violating condition within a prescribed time period. For idling violations, committing to correct the violating condition is meaningless because of the ephemeral nature of vehicular idling. The proposed rule, by providing for admissions instead of stipulations with regard to section 24-163 of the Administrative Code, will allow respondents to admit and pay summonses online through the Office of Administrative Trials & Hearings (“OATH”) website, instead of waiting to receive a stipulation offer from DEP. This will expedite the handling of these cases and reduce the administrative burden on DEP and OATH that has been created by the rapid expansion in the number of idling summonses.

Subdivision (c) of section 1403 of the New York City Charter and sections 24-105, 24-163 and 24-178 of the Administrative Code authorize the Department to issue this proposed rule.

New text is underlined.

The text of the proposed rule follows:

Section 1. Paragraph 5 of Section 43-01 of Title 15 of the Rules of the City of New York is amended to read as follows:

5. Except in connection with violations of Section 24-163, a second or third offense means a violation of any section of the Air Code by the same respondent within two years of the date of occurrence of the prior violation, at the same premises (if premises-related), and

involving the same equipment. In connection with violations of Section 24-163, a second or third or subsequent offense is a violation by the same respondent within [two] three years of the date of occurrence of the prior violation(s) and involving the same [equipment] vehicle, where the prior violation(s) was for a violation of Section 24-163.

§ 2. Section 43-01 of Title 15 of the Rules of the City of New York is amended by adding a new subdivision 7 to read as follows:

7. Each summons for a violation of section 24-163 shall provide that a respondent may admit to such violation and pay the corresponding penalty amount set forth in section 43-02.

§ 3. Section 43-02 of Title 15 of the Rules of the City of New York is amended by changing the entries for sections 24-163 and 24-163(f), as follows:

§ 2. I hereby order that section 1 of Emergency Executive Order No. 99, dated May 23, 2022, is extended for five (5) days.

§ 3. I hereby direct the Fire and Police Departments, the Department of Buildings, the Sheriff, and other agencies as needed, to enforce the directives set forth in this Order in accordance with their lawful authorities, including Administrative Code sections 15-227(a), 28-105.10.1, and 28-201.1, and section 107.6 of the Fire Code. Violations of the directives set forth in this Order may be issued as if they were violations under Health Code sections 3.07 and 3.11, and enforced by the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene or any other agency.

EMERGENCY EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 102

INFANT FORMULA SHORTAGE

WHEREAS, in February 2022, concerns about contamination, at the Sturgis, Michigan facility of Abbott Nutrition, the largest manufacturer of infant formula in the United States, led to a voluntary recall of several lines of powdered formula and the temporary closure of the Sturgis facility; and

WHEREAS, the closure of the Sturgis facility, along with supply chain problems caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and other issues affecting the national economy, have led to shortages in infant formula, including in New York City, where, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the majority of parents and caregivers rely on some amount of formula to feed their babies, and the inability of parents and caregiver to obtain infant formula remains an imminent threat, to the health and safety of infants in New York City; and

WHEREAS, the state of emergency to address the infant formula shortage in the City of New York declared in Emergency Executive Order No. 98, issued on May 21, 2022, remains in effect;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the powers vested in me by the laws of the State of New York and the City of New York, including but not limited, to the New York Executive Law, the New York City Charter and the Administrative Code of the City of New York, and the common law authority to protect the public in the event of an emergency, it is hereby ordered:

Section 1. I hereby order that sections 2 and 3 of Emergency Executive Order No. 98, dated May 21, 2022, are extended for five (5) days.

§ 2. This Emergency Executive Order shall take effect immediately and shall remain in effect for five (5) days unless it is terminated or modified, at an earlier date.

EMERGENCY EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 93
May 13, 2022

WHEREAS, the state of emergency existing within DOC facilities, first declared in Emergency Executive Order No. 241, issued on September 15, 2021, and extended most recently by Emergency Executive Order No. 84, issued on April 28, 2022, remains in effect;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant, to the powers vested in me by the laws of the State of New York and the City of New York, including but not limited, to the New York Executive Law, the New York City Charter and the Administrative Code of the City of New York, and the common law authority to protect the public in the event of an emergency:

Section 1. I hereby direct that section 1 of Emergency Executive Order No. 90, dated May 8, 2022, is extended for five (5) days.

§ 2. This Emergency Executive Order shall take effect immediately and shall remain in effect for five (5) days unless it is terminated or modified, at an earlier date.

EMERGENCY EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 100
May 23, 2022

WHEREAS, on September 2, 2021, the federal monitor in the *Nunez* use-of-force class action stated steps must be taken immediately to address the conditions in the New York City jails; and

WHEREAS, excessive staff absenteeism among correction officers and supervising officers has contributed to a rise in unrest and disorder, and creates a serious risk, to the necessary maintenance and delivery of sanitary conditions; access to basic services including showers, meals, visitation, religious services, commissary, and recreation; and prompt processing, at intake; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Correction's (DOC's) staffing shortages are affecting health operations, including the availability of escorts to bring patients, to the clinic and of DOC personnel to staff the clinics; and

WHEREAS, this Order is given to address the effects of excessive staff absenteeism and in order to address the conditions, at DOC facilities; and

WHEREAS, the state of emergency existing within DOC facilities, first declared in Emergency Executive Order No. 241, issued on September 15, 2021, and extended most recently by Emergency Executive Order No. 84, issued on April 28, 2022, remains in effect;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant, to the powers vested in me by the laws of the State of New York and the City of New York, including but not limited, to the New York Executive Law, the New York City Charter and the Administrative Code of the City of New York, and the common law authority to protect the public in the event of an emergency:

Section 1. I hereby direct that section 1 of Emergency Executive Order No. 96, dated May 18, 2022, is extended for five (5) days.

§ 2. a. Notwithstanding any contrary provision of law, the Commissioner of Citywide Administrative Services is hereby authorized and directed to certify, in accordance with section 12-121 of the Administrative Code, that any position in the Department of Correction is one for which there is difficulty in the recruitment of personnel and that to restrict recruitment for such position to persons who meet the residency requirements prescribed by section 12-120 of the Administrative Code would not be in the public interest. Any person appointed to a position so certified shall not be required to establish or maintain residency as prescribed by section 12-120 of the Administrative Code as a condition of employment in such position.

b. The Commissioner of Citywide Administrative Services is further directed to take all necessary action, to ensure that, following the expiration or termination of the State of Emergency declared in Emergency Executive Order No. 241, dated September 15, 2021, and extended by subsequent orders, any person appointed to a position certified, pursuant to subdivision a of this section shall not be required to establish or maintain residency as prescribed by section 12-120 of the Administrative Code as a condition of continued employment in such position.

c. Subject to applicable law, this section shall remain in effect through May 23, 2024.

§ 3. This Emergency Executive Order shall take effect immediately and shall remain in effect for five (5) days unless it is terminated or modified, at an earlier date.

Section 1. I hereby order that section 1 of Emergency Executive Order No. 95, dated May 18, 2022, is extended for five (5) days.

§ 2. I hereby direct the Fire and Police Departments, the Department of Buildings, the Sheriff, and other agencies as needed, to enforce the directives set forth in this Order in accordance with their lawful authorities, including Administrative Code sections 15-227(a), 28-105.10.1, and 28-201.1, and section 107.6 of the Fire Code. Violations of the directives set forth in this Order may be issued as if they were violations under Health Code sections 3.07 and 3.11, and enforced by the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene or any other agency.

§ 3. This Emergency Executive Order shall take effect immediately and shall remain in effect for five (5) days unless it is terminated or modified, at an earlier date.

EMERGENCY EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 98
May 21, 2022
INFANT FORMULA SHORTAGE

WHEREAS, in February 2022, concerns about contamination, at the Sturgis, Michigan facility of Abbott Nutrition, the largest manufacturer of infant formula in the United States, led to a voluntary recall of several lines of powdered formula and the temporary closure of the Sturgis facility; and

WHEREAS, the closure of the Sturgis facility, along with supply chain problems caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and other issues affecting the national economy, have led to shortages in infant formula; and

WHEREAS, there is a shortage of specialty formulas, which presents a particular difficulty for families that rely on such formulas due to allergies or medical necessity; and

WHEREAS, on May 16, 2022, the Food and Drug Administration ("FDA") reached an agreement with Abbott Nutrition to safely recommence production in the Sturgis, Michigan facility by the end of the month, but it is anticipated that it will take up to eight weeks for the re-opening to result in more formula on store shelves; and

WHEREAS, according, to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the majority of parents and caregivers in New York City rely on some amount of formula to feed their babies; and

WHEREAS, the FDA has called on companies to issue purchasing limits to limit predatory behavior; and the Department of Justice has encouraged state attorneys general to use their powers to monitor and address price gouging in the infant formula market; and

WHEREAS, on May 18, 2022, President Biden, citing an “acute disruption” in the supply of infant formula, invoked the Defense Production Act, to ensure that manufacturers have the necessary ingredients to make safe and healthy infant formula, and has required suppliers to direct needed resources to infant formula manufacturers; and

WHEREAS, to accelerate the import of infant formula, President Biden has also directed the Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Agriculture to use Department of Defense commercial aircraft to transport infant formula that meets U.S. health and safety standards, to the United States; and

WHEREAS, the current difficulties parents and caregivers are experiencing in obtaining infant formula in New York City and nationwide have been widely reported; and

WHEREAS, the New York City Department of Consumer and Worker Protection has received complaints concerning allegations of sellers charging excessive prices for infant formula, and, pursuant to section 5-42 of Title 6 of the Rules of the City of New York, it is an unconscionable trade practice to sell or offer for sale certain goods, including infant formula, at an excessive price during a declared state of emergency in New York City; and

WHEREAS, the inability of parents and caregivers to obtain infant formula poses an imminent threat, to the health and safety of infants in New York City;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant, to the powers vested in me by the laws of the State of New York and the City of New York, including but not limited, to the New York Executive Law, the New York City Charter and the Administrative Code of the City of New York, and the common law authority to protect the public in the event of an emergency, it is hereby ordered:

Section 1. State of Emergency. A state of emergency related to a shortage in the supply of infant formula is hereby declared to exist within the City of New York.

§ 2. I hereby direct all agency heads, including the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection, the Department of Social Services, and the Mayor’s Office of Food Policy to take all appropriate and necessary steps to preserve public health while the shortage of infant formula persists.

§ 3. I hereby direct the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection to exercise its authority under section 5-42 of Title 6 of the Rules of the City of New York to prevent the charging of excessive prices for infant formula.

§ 4. This Executive Order shall take effect immediately. The State of Emergency shall remain in effect for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days or until rescinded, whichever occurs first. Additional declarations to extend the State of Emergency for additional periods not to exceed thirty (30) days shall be issued if needed.

NOTICE

Notice of Adoption

Notice of Adoption to amend rules to repeal certain violations and make other violations curable to reform small business regulations without compromising consumer and worker wellbeing.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY VESTED IN the Commissioner of the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection by Sections 1043 and 2203(f) of the New York City Charter and Section 20-104(b) of the New York City Administrative Code, and in accordance with the requirements of Section 1043 of the New York City Charter, that the Department amends Title 6 of the Rules of the City of New York.

This rule was proposed and published on November 30, 2022. A public hearing was held on December 30, 2022 and the Department received one comment from the public.

Statement of Basis and Purpose of Rule

The COVID-19 global pandemic caused financial instability for many small businesses in the City of New York. On January 4, 2022, in response to this crisis, the Mayor signed Executive Order 2 “Small Business Forward: Review and Reform of Compliance Costs on Businesses” (“EO2”). One goal of the reform was ensuring that small businesses face fewer unnecessary civil penalties. EO2 called for the reform of existing violations and penalties issued by several city agencies.

The Department of Consumer and Worker Protection was one of seven enforcement agencies which conducted a review of its existing

violations that are most frequently enforced through the issuance of notices of violations, and to the extent practicable, identified those violations most frequently issued to small businesses that could be repealed or modified to reduce regulatory burdens, increase equity, and support small businesses.

This rule amendment repeals certain violations and makes other violations curable to reform small business regulations without compromising consumer and worker wellbeing.

The violations repealed include:

- 1) Picture tubes sold or offered for sale without proper label (these are older televisions with a cathode ray tube or CRT); and
- 2) Vendor offering blood pressure reading services failed to post disclosure sign.

The violations that are now curable are:

- 1) Business fails to prominently and conspicuously display price list sign, or price list sign is not displayed at point at which orders are placed or payment is made, or lettering on sign is less than 1 inch.
- 2) Scale is not located between the buyer and seller.

READER'S GUIDE

The City Record (CR) is published each business day. The Procurement section of the City Record is comprised of notices of proposed New York City procurement actions, contract awards, and other procurement-related information. Notice of solicitations and other notices for most procurement methods valued at or above \$100,000 for goods, services, and construction must be published once in the City Record, among other requirements. Other procurement methods authorized by law, such as sole source procurements, require notice in the City Record for five consecutive editions. Unless otherwise specified, the agencies and offices listed are open for business Monday through Friday from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., except on legal holidays.

NOTICE TO ALL NEW YORK CITY CONTRACTORS

The New York State Constitution ensures that all laborers, workers or mechanics employed by a contractor or subcontractor doing public work are to be paid the same wage rate that prevails in the trade where the public work is being done. Additionally, New York State Labor Law §§ 220 and 230 provide that a contractor or subcontractor doing public work in construction or building service must pay its employees no less than the prevailing wage. Section 6-109 (the Living Wage Law) of the New York City Administrative Code also provides for a "living wage", as well as prevailing wage, to be paid to workers employed by City contractors in certain occupations. The Comptroller of the City of New York is mandated to enforce prevailing wage. Contact the NYC Comptroller's Office at www.comptroller.nyc.gov, and click on Prevailing Wage Schedules to view rates.

CONSTRUCTION/CONSTRUCTION SERVICES OR CONSTRUCTION-RELATED SERVICES

The City of New York is committed to achieving excellence in the design and construction of its capital program, and building on the tradition of innovation in architecture and engineering that has contributed to the City's prestige as a global destination.

VENDOR ENROLLMENT APPLICATION

New York City procures approximately \$17 billion worth of goods, services, construction and construction-related services every year. The NYC Procurement Policy Board Rules require that agencies primarily solicit from established mailing lists called bidder/proposer lists. Registration for these lists is free of charge. To register for these lists, prospective suppliers should fill out and submit the NYC-FMS Vendor Enrollment application, which can be found online at www.nyc.gov/selltonyc. To request a paper copy of the application, or if you are uncertain whether you have already submitted an application, call the Vendor Enrollment Center at (212) 857-1680.

SELLING TO GOVERNMENT TRAINING WORKSHOP

New and experienced vendors are encouraged to register for a free training course on how to do business with New York City. "Selling to Government" workshops are conducted by the Department of Small Business Services at 110 William Street, New York, NY 10038. Sessions are convened on the second Tuesday of each month from 10:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M. For more information, and to register, call (212) 618-8845 or visit www.nyc.gov/html/sbs/nycbiz and click on Summary of Services, followed by Selling to Government.

PRE-QUALIFIED LISTS

New York City procurement policy permits agencies to develop and solicit from pre-qualified lists of vendors, under prescribed circumstances. When an agency decides to develop a pre-qualified list, criteria for pre-qualification must be clearly explained in the solicitation and notice of the opportunity to pre-qualify for that solicitation must be published in at least five issues of the CR. Information and qualification questionnaires for inclusion on such lists may be obtained directly from the Agency Chief Contracting Officer at each agency (see Vendor Information Manual). A completed qualification questionnaire may be submitted to an Agency Chief Contracting Officer at any time, unless otherwise indicated, and action (approval or denial) shall be taken by the agency within 90 days from the date of submission. Any denial or revocation of pre-qualified status can be appealed to the Office of Administrative Trials and Hearings (OATH). Section 3-10 of the Procurement Policy Board Rules describes the criteria for the general use of pre-qualified lists. For information regarding specific pre-qualified lists, please visit www.nyc.gov/selltonyc.

NON-MAYORAL ENTITIES

The following agencies are not subject to Procurement Policy Board Rules and do not follow all of the above procedures: City University, Department of Education, Metropolitan Transportation Authority, Health & Hospitals Corporation, and the Housing Authority. Suppliers interested in applying for inclusion on bidders lists for Non-Mayoral entities should contact these

entities directly at the addresses given in the Vendor Information Manual.

PUBLIC ACCESS CENTER

The Public Access Center is available to suppliers and the public as a central source for supplier-related information through on-line computer access. The Center is located at 253 Broadway, 9th floor, in lower Manhattan, and is open Monday through Friday from 9:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., except on legal holidays. For more information, contact the Mayor's Office of Contract Services at (212) 341-0933 or visit www.nyc.gov/mocs.

ATTENTION: NEW YORK CITY MINORITY AND WOMEN-OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES

Join the growing number of Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises (M/WBEs) that are competing for New York City's business. In order to become certified for the program, your company must substantiate that it: (1) is at least fifty-one percent (51%) owned, operated and controlled by a minority or woman and (2) is either located in New York City or has a significant tie to New York City's business community. To obtain a copy of the certification application and to learn more about this program, contact the Department of Small Business Services at (212) 513-6311 or visit www.nyc.gov/sbs and click on M/WBE Certification and Access.

PROMPT PAYMENT

It is the policy of the City of New York to pay its bills promptly. The Procurement Policy Board Rules generally require that the City pay its bills within 30 days after the receipt of a proper invoice. The City pays interest on all late invoices. However, there are certain types of payments that are not eligible for interest; these are listed in Section 4-06 of the Procurement Policy Board Rules. The Comptroller and OMB determine the interest rate on late payments twice a year: in January and in July.

HOW TO READ CR PROCUREMENT NOTICES

Procurement notices in the CR are arranged by alphabetically listed Agencies, and within Agency, by Division if any. The notices for each Agency (or Division) are further divided into three subsections: Solicitations, Awards, and Lists & Miscellaneous notices. Each of these subsections separately lists notices pertaining to Goods, Services, or Construction.

Notices of Public Hearings on Contract Awards appear at the end of the Procurement Section.

At the end of each Agency (or Division) listing is a paragraph giving the specific address to contact to secure, examine and/or to submit bid or proposal documents, forms, plans, specifications, and other information, as well as where bids will be publicly opened and read. This address should be used for the purpose specified unless a different one is given in the individual notice. In that event, the directions in the individual notice should be followed.
