

New York City Department of Correction Annual Programs Report Calendar Year 2023

The Department's Division of Programs and Community Partnerships' ("the Division") mission is to support a safe and humane jail environment through targeted services and programs, and to foster successful reintegration for individuals who are released from Departmental custody to the community. Research has demonstrated that evidence-based programming designed to support behavioral change is an effective way to reduce recidivism. The Department of Correction ("Department" or "DOC") aims to strengthen positive outcomes by not solely investing in evidence-based correctional best practices, but afford a wide range of holistic programs and services to individuals in its custodial care. Accordingly, the Division provides programs and services in the following categories: 1) activities, 2) enrichment, 3) evidence-based, 4) reintegration, 5) clinical services, and 6) religious services.

Throughout calendar year 2023, the **Counseling Services Unit** provided access to social services, targeted individual engagement, and group counseling. The Counseling Services Unit is subdivided as follows:

- **Social Services:** This branch provides access to policy-driven social services, individual counseling, and therapeutic group sessions utilizing evidence-based curriculum. In calendar year 2023 the Department began insourcing and relied on the Social Services unit to provide services to individuals in custody to address criminogenic factors. Counselors facilitate daily evidence-based groups on topics such as anger management, cognitive behavioral therapy, dialectical behavior therapy, stress reduction, trauma-informed care, relapse prevention, classes on job readiness, anger management, financial literacy, vocational training, and other topics.
- **Program Counseling:** This branch provides evidence-based group programming and individual counseling, with a focus on promoting interpersonal relationships as a tool for behavior change. In 2022, the Department doubled the number of Program Counselor positions within the agency to increase access to comprehensive programming across the jails. In 2023, Program Counselors actively afforded services at Robert N. Davoren Center and Enhanced Supervision Housing (ESH) units.
- **Intervention and Special Population Services:** Aligned with best practices in addressing public health and public safety, the Department has created an internal non-uniformed team of Intervention Specialists and Social Workers to support people in immediate crisis and people experiencing acute challenges while adjusting to the correctional environment. The foundation of this team's work is rooted in restorative justice practices. This group provides specific and enhanced services including, but not limited to:
 1. Wellness Checks
 2. Family Interventions

3. Preventative and Responsive Care, which includes one-on-one sessions and wellness checks with people demonstrating self-injurious behaviors
4. Crisis Intervention and Behavioral Interventions
5. Grief Counseling
6. Restorative Justice Circles and other practices based in restorative justice.
7. Violence Reduction, which includes one-on-one sessions with high needs individuals or persons in need of support

In 2023, the responsibility for the New Admission Orientation process underwent a significant change. It transitioned to collaborate closely with the Intervention and Special Population Services. This shift aims to enhance the support provided to newly admitted individuals by ensuring a seamless integration of resources and guidance. While the process is initially implemented in the Eric M. Taylor Center (EMTC) for men, it has extended to the Rose M. Singer Center (RMSC), which houses women and gender-expansive individuals. The goal remains consistent: to equip all individuals navigating the system with comprehensive information and resources during their initial days within our facilities.

During this reporting period, the **Recreational Services Unit** continued to afford programming within housing areas, including Enhanced Supervision Housing (“ESH”) Levels 1 and 2. The unit organized a variety of activities, such as basketball tournaments, chess tournaments and ping pong tournaments. Additionally, it held congregate events, including poetry jams, talent shows, open mics, and a Double-Dutch contest. The Recreation Unit collaborated with the Tablet Operations Unit to create a tablet-based talent show, an island-wide basketball league was developed, and the unit embarked on new community partnerships such as the Twinning Project.

Throughout the year, the **Law Library Unit** worked to resume in-person law library services. During the pandemic, the Department afforded Law Library services in a modified manner whereby Legal Coordinators provided Law Library services via a request slip system. During this time, incarcerated individuals were able to visit the Law Library for typing and viewing of e-discovery, as well as legal assistance. By the end of calendar year 2022, in-person Law Library services became available in several facilities, and the Department continued to work towards full in-person Law Library services in all facilities in 2023.

The **Chaplaincy Services Unit** is comprised of four faiths: Catholic, Jewish, Muslim, and Protestant. The unit affords general religious programming and services that include worship sessions, religious education, study groups, congregate events, and community engagement. Chaplains also afford Individualized Religious Mentoring, which includes counseling, moments of prayer, daily readings, and pastoral guidance. The agency also relies on chaplains to make notification to next of kin of incarcerated persons as appropriate. Additionally, chaplains provide guidance and spiritual support to Department staff. Throughout 2023, chaplains assigned to the

unit worked closely with Department facilities in holding congregate religious services to include major religious celebrations that welcomed family members and volunteers to the island.

In calendar year 2023, DOC supported the Department of Education in expanding educational services for emergent adults and fostering a separate Adult Education component in the evenings. The **Educational Services Unit** continued partnerships with Manhattan College and Columbia University to provide postsecondary educational courses in addition to a partnership with LaGuardia Community College to support college-level learning opportunities.

During 2023, the **Fine and Performing Arts Unit** provided programs and services within the housing areas and in congregate program areas, and facilitated weekly programs, as well as large scale events. The unit is overseen by a Director and Deputy Director and consists of several Arts Project Coordinators. Many contracted and volunteer arts providers supported the Department in reintroducing a variety of programs (e.g., art, music, creative writing, and others) taking place throughout the day and evening, Monday through Saturday. As a result of collective efforts by the Arts Project Coordinators and community partners, arts enrichment was available during the calendar year at all facilities, including all ESH units. During this period, the Fine and Performing Arts Unit welcomed additional community partnerships to continue rounding out creative offerings island-wide.

The **Tablet Operations Program Unit** continued to provide tablets to people in custody and facilitate the delivery of programming content through these devices throughout 2023. This was a major Departmental initiative that started in 2022. The unit successfully distributed tablets to individuals across the Department, and staff continually engage with the population to ensure that, once individuals complete their new admission process, they are issued a tablet which they may keep in their possession for the duration of their incarceration. These tablets offer extensive functionality and accessibility, and free phone call capabilities, which is a significant upgrade from the prior tablet vendor. With the phone call feature, individuals are able to speak on the phone at their leisure, within Departmental phone call policy, instead of waiting to use the wall phone in the housing area. This has greatly expanded opportunities for individuals in custody to connect with their loved ones. During CY23, the Tablet program has continued to grow, seeing the addition of a Deputy Director and Program Coordinator. Additionally, tablet-based programming has seen an increase with the roll-out of a tablet-based, interactive Talent Show airing weekly, as well as the upcoming inclusion of content from various programmatic partners.

In 2023, The Department worked closely with the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice ("MOCJ") and its contracted organizations to afford discharge planning and post-release services, including placement into temporary hotel housing. This effort allowed the Department to use its authority under Article 6-A of New York State Correction Law to release 62 city-sentenced individuals to a work release program, connecting each with a community-based provider and housing assistance for those who need it. In 2023, the Department also supported providers with achievement ceremonies and community engagement days to recognize individuals' accomplishments and promote continued success.

Finally, in 2023 the Department lost funding for its **large-contracted providers** including Fedcap, Fortune Society, and Osborne Association. These partners provided behavioral interventions, reentry workshops, family-focused group sessions, wellness activities and more. While this posed a significant challenge to the Department, the Division continued to support individuals in custody by insourcing services. In addition, the Department worked closely with MOCJ and its contracted organizations to afford discharge planning and post-release services, including placement into temporary hotel housing.

After a halt and review of the Memorandums of Understanding (MOU) with organizations holding **small contracts** with the Department, in 2023 the services offered through these partners resumed. These niche programs enable the Department to afford targeted services to specific populations and, more generally, supplement the abovementioned programs with services of interest to incarcerated persons. Significantly, these programs reflect the feedback obtained through focus groups conducted in 2022, which included staff and persons in custody.
