#### In Re Public Hearing NYC - Department of Sanitation June 10, 2024

2	MS. LIGUORI: Good morning and welcome.
3	My name is Madelynn Liguori. I am Senior
4	Counsel in the Bureau of Legal Affairs for the
5	Department of Sanitation. Thank you for
6	attending this public hearing this morning.
7	DSNY is conducting this remote hearing in
8	accordance with the requirements of the City
9	Administrative Procedure Act. The purpose of
10	this hearing is to receive comments from the
11	public on DSNY's proposed rule relating to
12	commercial waste zone records and reporting
13	requirements.
14	This rule was published by DSNY in the
15	City Record on May 6, 2024, with a scheduled
16	hearing date of today, June 10, 2024.
17	Additionally, DSNY emailed copies of the rule
18	to all New York City local elected officials,
19	the City's fifty-nine community boards, media
20	and interested parties, and published the
21	proposed rule on its website.
22	In 2019, New York City enacted Local Law
23	199 requiring the establishment of a new
24	program for the collection of commercial waste.
25	The program, known as the commercial waste

2	zones program, is a collection system designed
3	to provide high-quality, low-cost service to
4	New York City businesses while advancing the
5	City's zero waste and sustainability goals by
6	limiting the number of private carters that can
7	operate in each zone. Its implementation is
8	currently underway. Under Local Law 199,
9	codified in Title 16-B of the New York City
10	Administrative Code, the Sanitation
11	Commissioner has divided the geographic area of
12	New York City into 20 commercial waste zones.
13	Pursuant to a request for proposals, three
14	private carters have been selected by the
15	Department to serve customers within each
16	commercial waste zone and five carters have
17	been selected to provide containerized
18	commercial waste collection services citywide.
19	The selected carters will be referred to as
20	"Awardees."
21	The request for proposals process
22	identified the carters that can provide high
23	quality service at competitive prices. The
24	resulting contracts with the Awardees include
25	standards for pricing, customer service,

2	safety, environmental health, and requirements
3	to promote the City's commitment to recycling
4	and sustainability.
5	Local Law 199 contains certain records and
6	reporting requirements, but it also requires
7	Awardees to comply with any rules promulgated
8	by the Department pertaining to the reporting
9	of information about the collection of
10	commercial waste. These requirements will
11	ensure that Awardees provide the information
12	that the Department deems necessary to further
13	the goals of the law.
14	Examples of new reporting requirements
15	include reports on waste generation estimates,
16	rates charged to customers, warnings or
17	violations issued, workplace injuries and
18	accidents and training records.
19	A court reporter is present today and will
20	record the hearing. You may present an oral
21	statement or submit written comments concerning
22	the proposed rule. We have been accepting
23	written comments on the proposed rule since it
24	was published. Today is the deadline for
25	submission of written comments. Such comments

7	We have been accepting written comments on the
8	proposed rule since it was published. Today is
9	the deadline for submission of written
10	comments. Such comments may be emailed
11	directly to nycrules@dsny.nyc.gov by 5PM today.
12	DSNY will make available a copy of all
13	written comments received through today,
14	together with the hearing transcript, for
15	viewing on its website within the next few
16	weeks.
17	DSNY will carefully consider all the
18	comments it receives today at the hearing and
19	all written comments it receives.
20	I will begin calling those of you who wish
21	to speak this morning in the order in which you
22	have signed up to testify. While the notice
23	asked that persons wishing to testify sign up
24	in advance of this hearing, anyone wishing to
25	testify at this time may do so by indicating in

2	the chat area that you wish to testify by
3	indicating your name and affiliation, if any.
4	When you speak, please say your name and
5	affiliation, and speak slowly and clearly so
б	that the court reporter can understand and
7	accurately record your statement. We also ask
8	that you limit your statement to three minutes.
9	I would now like to call on Council Member
10	Shaun Abreu to testify. Council Member.
11	MR. ABREU: Good morning. Can you hear
12	me?
13	MS. LIGUORI: Yes, loud and clear. Thank
14	you.
15	MR. ABREU: Good morning, everyone. I
16	want to thank you for the opportunity to
17	testify at today's rule-making hearing. My
18	name is Shaun Abreu, and I chair the Council's
19	committee on sanitation and solid waste
20	management.
21	Effective implementation of the Commercial
22	Waste Zones Law is a critical priority for the
23	Council, as is ensuring that businesses are
24	complying with commercial containerization
25	rules, given the importance of ensuring that

2	materials are recycled and that commercial
3	establishments are containerizing their waste.
4	I believe that private carters should be
5	obligated to notify Department of Sanitation
6	when they observe such violations as quickly as
7	possible, ideally within a few days. This
8	would allow DSNY to assist business owners and
9	remedy any issues or misunderstandings that
10	businesses may have, and also apply enforcement
11	mechanisms quickly and effectively when
12	necessary. Cleaner streets benefit us all, and
13	it's our shared responsibility that we get this
14	right.
15	Thank you so much for the opportunity to
16	testify.
17	MS. LIGUORI: Thank you so much, Council
18	Member, we really appreciate it.
19	MR. ABREU: Of course.
20	MS. LIGUORI: I would now like to call
21	Megan Carr for the New York Lawyers for the
22	Public Interest. Megan.
23	MS. CARR: Good morning. Good morning.
24	My name is Megan Carr, I am an environmental
25	justice legal fellow at New York Lawyers for

2	the Public Interest, known as NYLPI.
3	The manner in which DSNY handles,
4	processes, and moves waste across the City can
5	serve as a huge asset in the fight for
6	environmental justice or present an enormous
7	barrier. That's why NYLPI, as part of the
8	Transform, Don't Trash Coalition, has been a
9	strong supporter of the Commercial Waste Zones
10	Law, Local Law 199, since its inception. Five
11	years after its passage, we are still calling
12	on a robust, transparent, equitable, and
13	expedient implementation.
14	We believe that DSNY's proposed rule
15	changes accurately reflect the intention of the
16	law and we support their adoption.
17	One of the major motivations behind the
18	Commercial Waste Zones Law was to reduce
19	vehicle miles traveled, thus drastically
20	reducing vehicle emissions from the current
21	operating model in which haulers routinely
22	drive over a hundred miles a night,
23	crisscrossing the City and needlessly polluting
24	the air. This most effects New York's
25	environmental justice communities who already

live in areas with worse air quality,
exacerbated by diesel truck pollution.
With this purpose in mind, we are pleased
to see the addition of odometer readings to
Section 2056 on the list of information that
must be transmitted via the telematic system on
the commercial waste vehicles. We hope that
the reporting and tracking of that data will be
used by DSNY to ensure that Local Law 199 is
achieving its intended and expected results
when it comes to reducing VMT by fifty percent.
The chaotic, free-for-all nature of the
City's commercial waste zones industry
commercial waste industry, has made it
difficult to obtain accurate data on the
industry's effects, including waste generation
estimates, safety issues and rates charged to
customers, among other things. And for these
reasons, we are pleased to see many additions
to the recordkeeping requirements under
subchapter E 2060, which require recordkeeping
on all of these matters and more.
The full implementation of Local Law 199
will serve to greatly improve the environmental

2	footprint of the industry, as well as safety
3	for its many tireless workers. Continually
4	gathering, reporting, and amassing data on
5	other areas, such as waste generation, sets up
6	DSNY to continually improve the commercial
7	waste handling system in other ways and
8	commutes will for advocates seeking to reduce
9	waste more broadly. We are thus very
10	supportive of these recordkeeping requirements.
11	As mentioned above, improving worker
12	safety in this dangerous industry was a
13	priority in the fight for this law and must
14	remain a priority in its implementation. For
15	those reasons, we're happy to see the training
16	requirements that are added, as well as the
17	addition of annual training requirements, which
18	can help ensure that workers are properly
19	prepared for their role, increasing both their
20	safety and the safety of pedestrians and other
21	drivers across the City.
22	We do recommend amending Section 2062 A15,
23	which provides haulers with five business days
24	to notify DSNY when there is a breach of an
25	Awardee subcontractor. While there are likely

2	many circumstances where five business days is
3	an acceptable amount of time, we urge DSNY to
4	require a shorter period of time before
5	notification, whenever the breach is related to
6	workplace safety or labor practices. Where
7	safety is an issue, waiting five business days
8	is neither necessary nor acceptable.
9	In sum, we are supportive of these rules
10	and eager to see DSNY fully implement the
11	Commercial Waste Zones Law. This will create
12	momentus benefits for all New Yorkers,
13	producing safer streets, cleaner air, and
14	better conditions for the thousands of workers
15	in the commercial waste business
16	Savor one recommended amendment, we
17	strongly urge the adoption and reliable
18	enforcement of these rules.
19	Thank you for your time and the
20	opportunity to testify.
21	MS. LIGUORI: Thank you very much, Ms.
22	Carr.
23	I would now like to call Lacey Taubert,
24	from the Brooklyn Borough President's Office.
25	Lacey.

2	MS. TAUBERT: Hello, good morning. Thank
3	you for holding this hearing today. I'm
4	representing Brooklyn Borough President Antonio
5	Ranoso, who was the prime sponsor of the 2019
6	legislation that created the Commercial Waste
7	Zones Program when he was chair of the City
8	Council Sanitation Committee.
9	He attended last week's City Council
10	Oversight Hearing and made his disappointment
11	with DSNY's roll out of the plan clear.
12	Specifically, he made three points. One,
13	the DSNY putting a 40 perecent rate on pricing
14	in the RFP evaluation, undermined the spirit of
15	the law, which was specifically and
16	thoughtfully designed to address safety and
17	environmental justice.
18	Two, it is unacceptable that the RFP
19	process allowed bad actors, such as Cogent
20	(phonetic), to receive zone awards, especially
21	given it's updates mandate, to consider worker
22	safety and environmental practices, as outlined
23	in Local Law 198 of 2019.
24	And, three, starting with a pilot program,
25	rather than a full rollout is concerning. The

legislation never envisioned a pilot program,
and doing one threatens to undermine the
program if it's not executed well.
Given this, how DSNY oversees its Awardees
moving forward is ungently important. The
proposed rules under consideration today are
comprehensive and address many of the issues
that the legislation was meant to prioritize,
including worker safety and training, safe
streets, condition of trucks, enforcement of
route, and diversion of recyclable and
compostable waste from the landfill.
The borough president also appreciates the
DSNY clarifying the rule governing microhaulers
as ensuring their continued ability to operate
and to become subcontractors to Awardees was
important in crafting this bill.
It is critical for DSNY to enforce these
rules immediately in conjunction with the
program's rollout and for the agency to take
quick and decisive action if any of the
Awardees are found to be in violation.
Borough President is also calling for
transparency along with accountability. At

2	last week's hearing, Commissionere Tisch
3	committed to follow up with the Council by
4	sharing Awardee submitted safety plans. DSNY
5	should go further and make all of the
6	Awardee-submitted plans, including safety, zero
7	waste, education and outreach, subcontracting,
8	et cetera, public, so that businesses can
9	review them when choosing between designated
10	haulers.
11	Thank you again for the opportunity to
12	testify today. We look forward to seeing the
13	program officially begin and working with DSNY
14	to ensure that the law is as transformative to
15	the industry, our streets, and our environment
16	as it was intended to be.
17	MS. LIGUORI: Thank you, Lacey, very much.
18	If anyone else wishes to testify, you may
19	do so in the chat area or use the raise-hand
