

2	MS. LIGUORI: Good morning and welcome.
3	My name is Madelynn Liguori. I am Senior
4	Counsel in the Bureau of Legal Affairs for the
5	Department of Sanitation. Thank you for
6	attending this public hearing this morning.
7	DSNY is conducting this remote hearing in
8	accordance with the requirements of the City
9	Administrative Procedure Act. The purpose of
10	this hearing is to receive comments from the
11	public on DSNY's proposed rule relating to
12	commercial waste customers and private carters.
13	This rule was published by DSNY in the
14	City Record on December 5, 2024, with a
15	scheduled hearing date of today, January 6,
16	2025. Additionally, DSNY emailed copies of the
17	rule to all New York City local elected
18	officials, the City's fifty-nine community
19	boards, media and interested parties, and
20	published the proposed rule on its website.
21	Section 16-116(a) of the New York City
22	Administrative Code requires commercial
23	establishments in New York City to arrange for
24	the removal of solid waste by a licensed
25	private carter or by obtaining a trade waste

2	permit from the New York City Business
3	Integrity Commission allowing the establishment
4	to dispose of its own solid waste. Section
5	16-116(b) requires commercial establishments to
б	post a sign noting the day and time that such
7	establishment's trade waste is picked up or, if
8	such establishment removes its own waste, the
9	sign must note the registration number issued
10	by the BIC. Section 16-116(c) exempts from
11	these requirements any commercial establishment
12	that generates infrequent or insignificant
13	amounts of waste and authorizes the Sanitation
14	Commissioner to promulgate rules determining
15	what constitutes infrequent waste or
16	insignificant amounts of waste. Section 1-06
17	of Title 16 of the Rules of the City of New
18	York currently provides that a commercial
19	establishment must generate less than twenty
20	gallons of trade waste within a seven-day
21	period to meet the definition of infrequent
22	waste or insignificant amounts of waste to be
23	exempt from the requirements of Section
24	16-116(a) and (b).
25	This rule proposes to lower the threshold

2	of trade waste that is considered to be
3	infrequent waste or insignificant amounts of
4	waste from twenty gallons to one gallon within
5	a seven-day period. This reduction is
6	necessary because some commercial
7	establishments have been setting out their
8	trade waste at the curb for DSNY to collect or
9	setting such material in DSNY street corner
10	litter baskets. This rule will make it clear
11	that a commercial establishment must retain a
12	private carter to collect and remove trade
13	waste generated at such establishment for
14	proper disposal if such establishments generate
15	more than one gallon of trade waste within a
16	seven-day period.
17	Commercial establishments are already
18	required by rule to place their waste out in a
19	bin or container. This rule will also allow
20	any commercial establishment that generates
21	twenty gallons of waste or less over a period
22	of seven consecutive days to share these
23	containers with another commercial
24	establishment, provided that both entities are
25	customers that have agreements with the same

2	private carter in accordance with all rules and
3	regulations and follow all applicable rules
4	relating to the setout of materials for a
5	private carter.
6	Private carters sometimes utilize a flat
7	billing method where they charge a customer the
8	same flat monthly fee based on an estimate of
9	the average amount of waste the customer
10	produces. Rules of the Business Integrity
11	Commission currently address waste surveys used
12	to determine flat billing amounts. These rules
13	will not apply to designated carters subject to
14	the Department's commercial waste zone rules
15	within an implemented commercial waste zone.
16	Therefore, the Department is proposing
17	provisions to ensure that private carters
18	conduct waste surveys to generate an accurate
19	estimate of the average amount of waste a
20	customer produces when a flat billing method is
21	used.
22	A court reporter is present today and will
23	record the hearing. You may present an oral
24	statement or submit written comments concerning
25	the proposed rule. We have been accepting

2	written comments on the proposed rule since it
3	was published. Today is the deadline for
4	submission of written comments. Such comments
5	may be emailed directly to
6	nycrules@dsny.nyc.gov by 5PM today.
7	DSNY will make available a copy of all
8	written comments received through today,
9	together with the hearing transcript, for
10	viewing on its website within the next few
11	weeks.
12	DSNY will carefully consider all the
13	comments it receives today at the hearing and
14	all written comments it receives.
15	I will begin calling those of you who wish
16	to speak this morning in the order in which you
17	have signed up to testify. While the notice
18	asked that persons wishing to testify sign up
19	in advance of this hearing, anyone wishing to
20	testify at this time may do so by indicating in
21	the chat area that you wish to testify by
22	indicating your name and affiliation, if any.
23	When you speak, please say your name and
24	affiliation, and speak slowly and clearly so
25	that the court reporter can understand and

2	accurately record your statement. We also ask
3	that you limit your statement to three minutes.
4	I will now begin by calling our first
5	person to testify, Thomas Toscano, the CEO of
б	Boro-Wide Recycling. Mr. Toscano.
7	MR. TOSCANO: Good morning. My name is
8	Thomas Toscano, as you just said, and I'm the
9	president of Boro-Wide Recycling.
10	We're in favor of the rule that reduces
11	the infrequent or insignificant amounts of
12	waste to one gallon, so we'll start in a place
13	of agreement.
14	We're also in favor of allowing customers
15	that generate less than twenty gallons of waste
16	over a seven-day period to aggregate their
17	waste with other customers in shared
18	containers. However, we want to call to the
19	DSNY's attention how this will make the survey
20	process, that is the subject of the balance of
21	this proposal changes, more difficult.
22	Since a customer will not be able to
23	separate their waste without leaving the waste
24	outside the container, in violation of other
25	Department rules, understand that in order to

2	bill different customers for different amounts
3	of waste in the container, we have to segregate
4	it to figure out who is producing what. This
5	will not be too much of a factor with
6	volume-billed accounts, but for weight-based
7	accounts, there probably won't be too many, but
8	it could create some difficulty in serving
9	these accounts. Therefore, we suggest that
10	these container aggregation rules be limited to
11	accounts that are billed based only on volume.
12	The remainder of the proposed changes deal
13	with the survey process, and in a lot of ways,
14	these differ significantly from the current
15	rules in effect with the Business Integrity
16	Commission. So, for that reason, I will for
17	reasons I will specify, we are opposed to
18	changes to this structure.
19	I will start by saying that I am a member
20	of the Trade Waste Advisory Board, and I have
21	attended almost every meeting for the past
22	decade or more with the BIC. I don't remember
23	a single topic raised by the BIC that indicated
24	there was a problem with the survey process.
25	Put more simply, the BIC tracks complaints and

2	they never raised widespread survey issues with
3	the industry. If we have a system with very
4	few complaints, why would we want to revamp it?
5	We recommend the DSNY mirror the current rules
6	that the BIC has with regard to surveys.
7	The proposed changes mandate surveys
8	within thirty days of an account going to
9	flat-rate billing. We were just involved in
10	the transition of the Queens Central Zone,
11	where we onboard nearly 5,000 customers. It
12	was a daunting task, and I cannot imagine
13	adding thirty-day surveys to the process for
14	all these accounts. It would also affect the
15	number of assigned accounts we have offered to
16	take from the DSNY and the future zones that
17	are rolled out that we're participating in.
18	Further, the awardees that will be subject
19	to these rules have already proposed survey
20	processes to the DSNY in their proposals.
21	Zones were awarded based on these proposals,
22	and those proposals met further requirements
23	regarding third-party audits to customers that
24	requested them.
25	The new survey process seems to disregard

2	those proposals, along with the BIC rules that
3	had worked for decades. These changes could
4	inadvertently cost customers more.
5	There is a third-party survey option
6	available to customers. The proposals do not
7	require that all of the independent surveys be
8	free, the ones from the carters are always
9	free, just to be clear, but if a customer and
10	the awardee dispute a survey, the third-party
11	resolution could cost the customers a fee
12	because of the annual survey requirement.
13	Again, we suggest the DSNY adopt the BIC
14	rules that do not require a survey and only
15	give the customers a right to request a survey
16	up to twice annually.
17	If the DSNY wants a mandated survey, they
18	should only be required for customers producing
19	more than twenty yards of waste and recycling a
20	month or 1,500 pounds of material in a month.
21	This would eliminate small producers of waste
22	and recycling and would reserve those
23	labor-intensive measures to the larger
24	producers that need surveys and are currently
25	getting them pretty frequently.

2	That's it. Thank you.
3	MS. LIGUORI: Thank you very much, Mr.
4	Toscano.
5	I am now gonna call for Josh Haraf, the
6	vice president for New York City Market at
7	Action Environmental Services. Mr. Haraf.
8	MR. HARAF: Good morning. Thanks for the
9	opportunity to express a response to the DSNY's
10	proposed rule changes sectoring
11	containerizations and waste generation audits
12	for commercial waste collection.
13	My name is Josh Haraf. I'm the market
14	vice president for New York City at Action
15	Environmental Services, a subsidiary of
16	Interstate Waste Services.
17	Over the past twenty-five years, Action
18	has serviced thousands of customers across the
19	five boroughs and is prepared to navigate our
20	fellow community businesses throughout the
21	transition to a TWD model.
22	We champion the consistency of our
23	service, a commitment to our customers'
24	experience, and the affordability of an
25	essential service, and that is why we strongly

2	feel that the changes being proposed for
3	commercial waste generation audits will impose
4	undue and substantial additional effort, time,
5	confusion, and cost for, both, awardees and
б	customers. As zones are implemented, it's our
7	priority to limit customer disruption and we
8	believe the prerogative will be burdened by
9	these new waste audit requirements.
10	As we're all aware, Local Law 199 incited
11	vast regulatory reform with real community
12	impact. Best practices for a successful
13	regulatory transition would suggest close
14	collaboration among DSNY, BIC, awardees, and
15	customers as commercial waste zones are rolled
16	out.
17	For this reason, Action reiterates our
18	support for intro number 352, primarily
19	sponsored by Council Member Sandy Nurse, for
20	the creation of a CWZ working group that
21	includes all stakeholders that can collectively
22	address CWZ rollout issues with the broadest
23	amount of both knowledge and experience.
24	As it pertains to the commercial
25	generators of infrequent or insignificant

2	waste, Action supports these new rules
3	regarding small waste generators. The
4	consolidation of collections for this group
5	will likely save time and effort for both
6	awardees and customers. However, we recommend
7	DSNY consider different implications of this
8	rule for weight versus volume customers.
9	As it pertains to the frequency and volume
10	of waste audits, we believe that the main
11	priority during a transition period should be
12	the accuracy and ease of a customer service.
13	If awardees are required to survey every
14	customer that utilizes a flat-billing method
15	within thirty days after the date of the first
16	invoice, awardees will be inundated with waste
17	audits to perform.
18	Based on the customer data provided to
19	awardees by the DSNY during the Queens Central
20	recent transition period, one zone contained
21	nearly 12,000 customers. If the DSNY intends
22	to rollout multiple zones simultaneously, the
23	only way to comply with this rule will be to
24	purchase new scales for all CWZ vehicles,
25	incurring an increase in overall cost

1 PROCEEDINGS 2 of service. 3 Based on the proposed audit cycles, awardees could be performing waste audits 4 5 during every month of the year for periods 6 lasting a minimum of thirty days for each 7 customer. Tracking a respective customer's waste audit periods will become onerous to 8 9 individually monitor and acquire dedicated 10 office staff to adequately address each audit. 11 The current BIC regulations, an awardee maintains zero waste plan afford customers the 12 13 avenue to request waste surveys while 14 maintaining awardee autonomy to perform them in 15 a manner that preserves operational and 16 financial practicality. The proposed rules did not account for the

The proposed rules did not account for the strenuous effort required by awardees to constantly perform audits, nor did they consider customer rate and service confusion during an on-boarding period in which customer education is critical.

If awardees must reconcile previous invoices against the first waste audit, that calls to question the process in CWZ waste

2	reporting procedures for service agreement rate
3	adjustments, rebates, discounts, additional
4	fees based on audit results, and overall
5	customers confusion for what they owe.
6	Rather than publicly announce the standard
7	timing for waste audits, Actions strongly
8	recommends the DSNY to preserve the integrity
9	of waste surveying by accepting awardees'
10	proposals within respective zero-waste plans.
11	There are drastic operational and financial
12	implications from the proposed rule changes,
13	and we would like to caution DSNY to consider
14	the breadth of the impact these changes will
15	impose past the intention of the amendment.
16	Thank you for your attention and
17	consideration.
18	MS. LIGUORI: Thank you very much,
