Three Consecutive Years of Serving Over 100,000 Young People

Celebrating 61 years of programming, NYC's Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) wrapped up another impactful summer, providing jobs and career exploration to young New Yorkers throughout the five boroughs.

The 2024 application for participants and worksites was launched on January 22, 2024, marking the earliest release to date and underscoring a strong commitment to program quality.

This early rollout gave participants ample time to prepare for their summer experiences and enabled providers to collaborate with NYC businesses and nonprofits to secure additional worksites.





Meeting Youth Where They Are

Through a variety of initiatives, DYCD aims to reach young New Yorkers from all corners of the city, regardless of their background or barriers.

We provide different program options for targeted populations. This ensures that each participant enjoys a personalized, tailored experience throughout the summer.









Demographics Breakdown





Creating Opportunities In Every Corner of the City



Youth Served Through Lottery! All NYC Residents aged 14–24 and legally allowed to work in the US are able to apply to the SYEP Community-Based option!

Participants apply to a provider of their choice, and selections are made randomly within each providers' pool of applicants, giving everyone a fair chance at securing a spot. This is SYEP's largest and most accessible program option.

Aligning Summer Jobs With School-Year Learning

Special Highlight: United Activities Unlimited (UAU) participants from Alfred E. Smith High School were placed as automotive shop interns and graphic design interns at their own school.

The school hosted 32 participants for SYEP, where their responsibilities included assisting the shop teacher with diagnosing and repairing vehicles, as well as creating designs and producing printed materials using commercial printing equipment.





Recruitment Efforts

SYEP collaborated with DYCD Cornerstone programs to enhance outreach efforts for NYCHA residents. DYCD also hosted more than a dozen NYCHA Digital Van events.

Through the vans, youth had the opportunity to apply on the spot. They had access to free, reliable internet, and on-site assistance from DYCD representatives.



Engaging Project-Based Learning for Younger Youth Participants

Project-Based Learning (PBL) is a hands-on approach that allows participants to apply concepts in realworld contexts. This makes the learning experience more memorable than traditional lecture-based methods. Additionally, tackling real-world problems and projects with concrete outcomes inspires students to take ownership of their education.

The NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) has been a valued partner of DYCD for many years.

Each year, they not only host interns, but also provide mentorship and create pathways to careers in health and government for SYEP participants.

Juanita Saldivar, Director of Employee Relations at DOHMH, has led the SYEP-DOHMH partnership for **over four decades.**

Juanita supports the numerous improvements made by DYCD that have enhanced the overall experience for both worksite supervisors and interns.

Many participants have continued their careers at DOHMH after their summer internships. For example, Tyrese Fitzalbert-Couchman (SYEP '23) is now working full-time in the DOHMH Human Resources office.

This summer, select vo participants had the incredible opportunity to earn Professional and Technical Development (PTD) hours by attending weekly workshops at Google.



NYCPS Office of Food & Nutrition Services (OFNS)

This summer, OFNS welcomed 200 SYEP participants to support school food initiatives across nearly 80 sites.

The department also organized weekly career exploration events for their interns, including tours of Essex Market and the Department of Sanitation's composting facilities, alongside panels and workshops in culinary arts and food justice.

These events helped participants explore careers and key topics in food advocacy, urban farming, and the connection between food, personal health, and planetary wellbeing.

Paving the Way to Top Careers

Ladders for Leaders, one of our standout programs, equipped 1,258 high-achieving NYC youth with 30 hours of pre-employment training and connected them to prestigious internships at top companies.

The Group Effort Initiative (GEI) is a nonprofit organization founded by **Ryan Reynolds** in 2020 to address racial disparities in the media and entertainment industry.

Since its inception, GEI has partnered with the City of Los Angeles to create internship opportunities for young people with major entertainment companies like Sony Pictures, Disney, and FilmNation Entertainment.

This year, GEI expanded its efforts to New York City, helping youth step into the spotlight through partnerships with SYEP and Ladders for Leaders.
