






New Announcement for Liberians

On June 28, 2024, the U.S. Government extended Deferred Enforced Departure (DED) for Liberians.





This means that for the next 24 months, eligible Liberians won't face deportation from the U.S., and they can apply for a work permit. To qualify, you must have continuously lived in the U.S. since May 20, 2017, among other criteria.

You may qualify if you:

- Have continuously lived in the U.S. since May 20, 2017, OR
- Are applying/have applied for a green card through the Liberian Refugee Immigration Fairness (LRIF) program

Applying for a Work Permit



The U.S. Government is automatically extending Category A-11 work permits with expiration dates from 2020-2024. These work permits are now valid through June 30, 2026.



You can keep working without applying for a new work permit.



You only need to apply for a new work permit if you want to receive a new card.

BEWARE OF LEGAL IMMIGRATION SCAMS AND FRAUDULENT ACTORS

Remember:

- Only a licensed attorney or a DOJ Accredited
 Representative can file applications on your behalf.
- A public notary who is not a licensed attorney is unable to fill out these forms/file them on your behalf.
 They also cannot charge you to do this.



Immigration law is complicated.

Beware of immigration legal scams or fraudulent providers who may indicate otherwise and make false promises, such as:

- A way to get a work permit or visa immediately.
- Statements indicating that there are **no risks or consequences**.
- Claims of **special influence** with immigration authorities.
