Recent Chinatown Connections Announcement



The City and State came together on February 9th to announce Chinatown Connections – a joint city and state investment that will dramatically improve public space and traffic safety in Chinatown.

- Support connections with surrounding communities by creating safer pedestrian and bike connections at Worth Street and Chatham Square





Project History Planning Efforts for Park Row and Kimlau Square







Recently Completed Engagement

Virtual workshop: June 26, 2023

- 80 members of the public attended
- Park Row and Frankfort identified by the community as a priority
- Kimlau Square identified as a priority, with specific mention of the conditions of materials, traffic flow, and unsafe crossings to and from the Square



In-person workshops: July 26 & August 3, 2023

- Three in-person workshops held at Kimlau Square and the Brooklyn Bridge Arches
- Recorded over 200 survey responses
- The 3 events were attended by over 100 members of the public with a diverse age range and representation of users that included, residents, local businesses, students, and tourists.
- Pedestrians (locals) and tourists perceive Park Row as closed and inaccessible due to security infrastructure. There was general consensus for bike and ped improvements.
- The current condition of Kimlau e.g. lighting, uneven pavement, etc. creates a hazard for users.


Unconventional intersections disrupt the pedestrian flow of the millions who walk through Chinatown every year

Proposed Circulation Patterns for Peds, Bikes, and Transit (blue)





Project Overview





Scope: Chinatown Connections is a \$55M Project with 3 Key Components


With \$11.5M in DOS grants, NYC DOT is contributing an additional \$44.3M in City Capital for a total project budget of \$55.8M

The City's project scope includes 3 major components (state funding in brackets):

- 1. Renovating Kimlau Square (\$5M)

 Expand public space at Kimlau Square to support a broader mix of community events, draw visitors into the neighborhood, and provide open space in the heart of the community.
- 2. Beautifying the Park Row Connection to Chinatown (\$4M) Implement a Street Improvement Project in the nearterm to beautify and improve accessibility at Park Row from the Brooklyn Bridge to Kimlau Square, while engaging on future capital improvements in the long-term.
- 3. Creating a Chinatown Welcome Gateway (\$2.5M)

 Build a landmark gateway to commemorate the cultural heritage of the area and draw visitors to the neighborhood



Summer 2024 Traffic Study


Kimlau Square and Park Row

Three general scenarios will be studied:

- Only Kimlau Square Improvements
- Only Park Row Reopening
- Both Kimlau Square Improvements and Park Row Reopening

Study will analyze:

- Vehicular, Bicyclists, and Pedestrian Counts
- Travel time/travel speeds
- Parking and loading operations
- Changes in travel patterns/circulation in Park Row reopening scenarios










1. Renovating Kimlau Square

Alignment of intersection geometry, improving pedestrian crossings, and placemaking



2. Beautifying Park Row

- Enhance pedestrian and cyclist experience
- Beautify the corridor through signage, art opportunities, and planters
- Improve NYPD security checkpoints and rationalize parking
- Create safer crossings and better connections to Park Row


3. Creating a Chinatown Welcome Gateway

Chinatown Connections will be supported by an extensive and inclusive engagement process

The engagement process for the capital improvements is expected to span approximately 18 months.

 Engagement for the Park Row SIP will begin in Spring 2024, ahead of implementation in Spring/Fall 2024.

The design engagement process will consist of:

- Regular CCWG and Gateway Subgroup Meetings;
- Public Engagement Events at Key Milestones;
- Community Board Meetings;
- An Artist Selection Process run by NYC Department of Cultural Affairs for the Welcome Gateway, and;
- Targeted stakeholder conversations, as needed.


Language Accessibility: All engagement materials will be bilingual and all meetings will have Mandarin and Cantonese interpretation.

After completion of design: Construction manager will continue communications and engagement with the local community and community boards during construction.




NY State Downtown Revitalization Initiative

In December 2022, **Governor announced \$20m investment to 11 projects in Chinatown** in recognition of the acute effects of the pandemic on Chinatown's businesses.
