Karesia Batan, Chair welcomed everyone to the Arts and Cultural Affairs Committee meeting.

Karesia Batan introduced Kyle Dancewicz and Cheryl Chan from the Sculpture Center (presentation attached #1)

- Kyle Dancewicz, Deputy Director of Sculpture Center introduced himself.
- Cheryl Chan is the Institutional Giving and Board Relations Manager
- Sculpture Center is located in LIC for 20 years at 44-19 Purves Street
- The Center is free and open to the public.
- Founded by artists in 1928, when it was called Clay Club.

- The Sculpture Center provides an international forum that connects artists and audiences by presenting exhibitions, commissioning new work, and generating scholarship.
- The building they are located in was a trolley repair factory.
- The Sculpture Center focuses on under-represented artists. They give artists the opportunity to make new work as a young artist, mid-career artist, or established artist who has not shown extensively in NYC.
- The Sculpture Center has an annual open call for emerging artists and receive 900 proposals each year.
- They host public programs and events, artist talks, book launches, concerts, workshops and more.
- Sculpture Center has an email newsletter.
- The Sculpture Center does outreach in the local Queens newspapers, and at La Guardia Community College.
- Short discussion on how the Sculpture Center could get the word out about their open calls.
- Open Call and the Commission Works are two different projects.
- Commissioning Program is solo exhibitions and Open Call is also commissioned as the Sculpture Center supports production.
- The range on the commission works can be from \$1,000 \$10,000 depending on the intensity of the project.
- There will be a book sale at the Sculpture Center in mid-March and on May 10<sup>th</sup> there will be a public exhibition with an artist.
- The Annual Call is open from June and closes in August.
- A question was asked about the Sculpture Center's relationship with the developers / tenants in the neighborhood? They have a friendly relationship and in the beginning the Sculpture Center would host events for the developers.

Karesia Batan invited Black Village Arts, Founder / Creative Director Brandi Jones to talk about programming and opportunities for artists to join the collective. Brandi Jones was not able to present. Karesia Batan shared the presentation with the Arts & Cultural Affairs Committee (*presentation attached #2*)

- They are looking to expand their artist roster.
- In honor of Black History Month, Karesia Batan wanted to highlight them.
- They are based in Jamaica but serve everywhere.
- Black Village Arts is an organization making arts education more affordable and accessible for black and brown youth in underserved communities.
- They inspire their youth to prioritize their mental health by being their most expressive and open selves through art.
- Black Village Arts has held over 100 free or low-costing art workshops throughout Queens and Brooklyn. Servicing ages 4-14, their art programming specifically target early childhood education, behavioral health and youth development.

- Kenny Greenberg mentioned a show called Luminous that will be at Culture Lab.
  It has 30 participating artists and 70 works. It originally came about from a
  diseased neon artist. Proceeds from the auction will go to benefit Culture Lab.
