A Word from the District Manager

Dear Resident,

The Department of Transportation (DOT) started night resurfacing in locations within Community District 8. Some roads have been milled (*i.e. sections of 188th Street*) and have not yet been resurfaced. Here is why...

After the Department of Transportation mills a street for resurfacing, it remains as-is for about two or three weeks. This is to allow enough time for utility companies and other City agencies to do necessary road work prior to applying asphalt. Once the street is resurfaced there is an embargo on disturbing the roadway. Only emergency work can be done. Furthermore, there is a fee increase for work to be done during the embargo. This is to ensure that we benefit from a smooth driving surface for longer.

Starting in July, regular daytime resurfacing will start within our boarders. Previously, we received a resurfacing list from the DOT in April. We are still awaiting the resurfacing list for our area. We hope to publish it in our June Newsletter before work begins and via email to our contact list. I encourage you to contact our office to request to be added to our email list.

BSA Cal. No. 214-06-BZ – 196-23 Hillside Avenue/BBL 4-10509-265 – This is an application to extend the term of a variance, which expires on April 10, 2022, at the above referenced automotive station originally granted under BSA Cal. No. 673-53-BZ on February 23, 1995, in an R3-2 zoning district.

<u>Presentation by Ms. Elyse Foladare from Eric Palatnik's Office representing the applicant</u> – They want to keep the gas station the same. They are proposing to add ADA ramps and more ADA compliance. It is a BP gas station. All the BP stations are upgrading to this change. This is the only amendment they are seeking.

Marc A. Haken made a motion to approve BSA Cal. No. 214-06-BZ – 196-23 Hillside Avenue to extend the terms of a variance for 10 years, seconded by Susan Cleary.

Committee Reports:

Health Minute with **Dr. Penny Stern,** Health Committee Chair – Dr. Stern spoke about MRIs. She informed us that they have created a portable MRI machine. It can be moved around the hospital hall-ways, to the bedside of the patients so that they don't have to be transported to the MRI room. **Prostate Cancer** – There is a new approach to treat this disease, especially men in advanced stages of the

disease who have not done well in standard treatments. The new treatment involves driving radiation, then directing it into a cancer cell while sparing the healthy tissue that's around it.

Sickle Cell Disease – There have been lots of treatment options over the years. They really have improved, including the use of bone marrow transplants which are complicated and dangerous.

Guest Speaker:

Richard David, Director of Regional Community Affairs - Con Edison – Mr. David spoke about the increase in Con Edison bills. He spoke about the reasons why the bills are being generated the way they are. There are three parts to a Con Edison bill: supply cost, delivery charge and surcharges plus taxes. Riker's Island Letter to Mayor Eric Adams – Kevin Forrestal, *Executive Committee Member* – A letter was drafted by Community Board 9Q (CB9Q) to the Mayor requesting reconsideration of the decision to close the Riker's Island Jail and building Borough Based Jails, especially in Kew Gardens. CB9Q supports an alternate proposal to rebuild Riker's Island. Mr. Forrestal asked that Board Members approve sending a letter supporting CB9Q.

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Did you know?

What's life like for Asian Americans? Get the facts.

During <u>Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month</u>, which has been officially recognized every May since 1990, we reflect on Asian Americans' and Pacific Islanders' rich contributions to our country's history. These 12 facts offer a snapshot of life for Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders today, based on available data from the Pew Research Center and the U.S. Census Bureau.

- * 7% of the U.S. population is Asian American, as of 2019. This includes those who identify as Asian, Native Hawaiian, or Pacific Islander either alone or in combination with one or more other races.
- * Hawaii is the state with the largest share of Asian Americans 57% of Hawaiian residents are Asian American. California follows with 17%.
- * 88% the growth of the Asian American population in the U.S. from 2000 to 2019. This makes Asian Americans the fastest-growing racial or ethnic group in the country.
- * The number of Asian American eligible voters more than doubled between 2000 to 2020. In 2020, Asian Americans accounted for about 5% of the eligible voter population in the U.S. And they are the only major racial or ethnic group in which naturalized citizens represent a greater share of voters (67%) than U.S.-born citizens (33%).
- * 27% of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders live in multigenerational households. In comparison, 19% of all Americans live in multigenerational households. A multigenerational household has at least two adult generations or grandparents and grandchildren younger than 25.
- * 7% of Asian Americans lived in poverty in 2019. Overall, 11% of Americans lived in poverty in 2019.
- * 10% of U.S. businesses are owned by Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, as of 2018. This includes 577,835 Asian-owned businesses and 6,653 owned by Americans of Pacific Islander and/or Native Hawaiian descent.
- * 66% of Asian Americans and 67% of Pacific Islanders aged 16 and older participated in the labor force in 2019. This is about on par with the total U.S. labor force participation rate (64%). The labor force includes people who are either working or actively looking for work.
- * 56% of Asian Americans aged 25 and older have a bachelor's degree or higher, as of 2019. By contrast, 18% of Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders have a bachelor's degree or higher, and 33% of all Americans are similarly educated.
- * \$98,174 was the median income of an Asian American household in 2019. In comparison, the median income for all U.S. households was \$68,703.
- * 36% of Asian American adults say religion is very important in their lives. Whereas, 53% of all American adults say the same.
- * 45% of Asian American adults say they feel a sense of spiritual peace and well-being at least once a week. In comparison, 59% of all American adults say the same.
