$A\ W$ ord from the District Manager \dots

Dear Resident:

While you are planning your summer vacations, thieves, burglars and scam artists are not. They are always working hard to take your hard earned possessions. The Police Department needs your help to stop them. There are things that you can do to prevent being a victim.

- Be alert and aware of your surroundings at all times. Criminals often target people who are distracted.
- If possible, stay in designated waiting areas or in view of the station booth clerk while awaiting your train. Never walk or stand near the edge of the subway platform.
- Travel on populated, well lit streets. If possible, travel with a friend.
- When driving, keep your doors locked and the windows closed. Make sure the gas tank is full. Maintain your car in good working order to avoid breakdowns.
- Always lock your car. Before getting into your car, check the back seat to make sure no one is hiding there.
- Avoid leaving valuables in your car. Whenever possible, place items out of sight in the trunk of your vehicle prior to reaching your destination. Never leave packages in the passenger compartment unattended.
- Plan your purchases in advance and carry only the amount of cash or number of credit cards necessary to make the purchase. If you must carry a large sum of money, divide the cash between your purse, pockets and wallet.
- Cancel credit cards you don't use and keep a record of the account numbers for each credit card you possess. This will facilitate reporting the theft or loss of the cards.
- Carry your purse close to your body. Place one end of the purse in the palm of your hand and the other in the bend of the elbow. Never wrap the strap around your body.
- If you are carrying a wallet, carry it in the breast pocket of your jacket or in your side pants pocket. The rear pants pocket is the easiest to pick.
- When in a restaurant, don't leave your handbag over the back of your chair or on the floor. Don't leave your belongings unattended.
- Don't wait until you have reached your front door to look for your keys. Have them ready in your hand. If a stranger is standing near your door, it may be a good idea not to go in until the situation feels safer. Lock your front door immediately upon entering your home.

According to the 107th Precinct, you must also beware of people calling on the telephone and asking you to wire money. The target victim of this scam is called by someone claiming to be a relative who needs bail money to get out of jail. Or they may claim your family member has been kidnapped and will demand that the ransom be paid via a money transfer service such as Western Union. Keep in mind that anyone calling and asking you for money MUST be considered suspicious. The Police Department NEVER solicits funds.

Here are some steps to take if this occurs:

- Hang up the phone.
- Remain calm and contact your loved ones to verify their safety.
- Never wire money in a panic.
- **Never** give your personal or financial information to the caller.
- CALL 9-1-1

I urge you to use these safety tips from the New York Police Department. Please share them with your friends, neighbors and members of your organization. It takes more than City Hall to make New York City great, it takes us all!



Did you know???



Any person who has pled or been found guilty or in default by the Environmental Control Board (ECB) for 12 or more Notices of Violation within a 12-month period will be deemed a repeat violator. Repeat violator designation applies even if the penalties are paid. Repeat violators may plead by mail; they do not have to appear in person. The violations that are included in this Repeat Violator program are:

I	Minimum	Maximum
Failure to Clean Sidewalk	\$100	\$300
Failure to Clean 18 Inches from Curb Into Stre	et \$100	\$300
Street Obstruction	\$150	\$300
Sidewalk Obstruction	\$100	\$300

Claim against The City of New York

Pursuant to an update to New York State General Municipal Law, Section 50(e), the New York City Comptroller's Office must now provide for the electronic filing of claims against the City of New York. This on-line application (the eClaim system) will allow you to file an electronic notice of claim.

- ◆ By law, claims generally must be filed within ninety (90) days of the incident and eClaim will allow you to file at any time of the day
- Only Personal Injury and Property Damage claims can be filed electronically using the eClaim system.
- Electronic filing offers more flexibility in filing options to both attorneys and self-represented parties. Anyone with access to an internet connection can file a claim at any time using the eClaim system. It allows for a quick filing of a notice of claim, with no postage expenses or handling costs.
- After submitting a claim using the eClaim system, a message confirming receipt will appear on screen that the filer should print for their records.
