

Background and Context





Why Victory Boulevard?

NYC DOT and MTA seek to improve bus service on Victory Boulevard because:

- There are 25,789 average daily riders on 16 routes that facilitate connections to the Staten Island Ferry.
- 619 injuries on the corridor in the past 5 years, including 60 who were severely injured. Victory Boulevard is a Vision Zero priority corridor.
- Existing bus priority treatments are due for an upgrade.
- According to a recent MTA survey, Staten Island bus riders would like MTA to prioritize reducing wait times, providing more reliable service, and minimizing delays.*




MTA Bus Blocked by Box Truck at Bus Stop on Victory Blvd






Existing Bus Lanes on Victory Boulevard

- There have been unpainted, curbside, peakperiod bus lanes on segments of Victory Boulevard since 1963
- NYC DOT implemented pedestrian and bus improvements on Victory Boulevard in 2016 near the Staten Island Ferry Terminal
- Red paint was installed on the block
 between Bay St and St Marks Pl in 2020





Issues Observed:


- Cars parked in bus lane during bus lane hours
- Bus speeds are slow beyond Forest Av where bus lane ends





Existing Conditions South of Forest Av


 From Forest Av to Wild Av, the mid-block roadway width on Victory varies from 30'-60'.




MTA Staten Island Bus Map


Victory Blvd Bus Ridership by Hour








Victory Boulevard AM Bus Speeds








Victory Boulevard Afternoon Bus Speeds







Victory Boulevard PM Bus Speeds








Who's Using Victory Boulevard?

On Victory Boulevard north of Jersey St, 48% of vehicular road users are bus riders*, while 52% ride in cars**.








Curbside Concept

- NYC DOT is studying the following potential treatments on Victory Boulevard to:
 - Upgraded existing lanes with red paint
 - Extended bus lane hours
 - Extended lanes south of Forest Av
- These design elements:
 - Reduce transit commute times
 - Increase safety
 - Create faster connections to the Staten
 Island Ferry
 - Maintain parking during off-hours
- Treatments could be implemented in targeted sections of the corridor


