SUBJECT: Places of Assembly, Addeptable Doon Handware (Light contenue of item 4 on peace 2 modified 3/10/75)

In order to provide uniform quidelines as to acceptable locking devices and hardware on doors serving as means of egress from places of assembly, item #2 of my memorandum of February 3, 1976, is supplemented as follows, pursuant to sub-article 100.0 of Section C26-004.4(j) and (k) of the new Building Code, and Section C26-285.0 of the old Building Code, regardless of the date of approval of the place of assembly:

- 1. Panic hardware shall be required on all doors in F-1 places of assembly (theatres, churches, etc.) with 75 on more people, and F-2, F-3 and F-4 places of assembly (outdoors, and messeums, restaurants, etc.) having an occupant load exceeding 300 people, in conformance with Section C26-304.4(k), except:
  - (a) Doors not equipped with any locking hardware or locks, and which are openable at all times; or
  - (b) Main entrance doors, only, having looks which may be looked from either side but which are kept unlocked during periods of public occupancy.
- n. No choss-hams, hasps, on any type of padicolding devices may be used, fastened, on attached to any exit doen.
- 3. Slide bolts on draw bolts may be permitted to be attached on egrass doors provided:
  - (a) It is readily operable; and
  - (b) in all locations other than made entrance doors, has devices which lock the bolt in an open position during periods of public occupancy.

4. (Modified at Chief Construction Inspectors Meeting 3/10/70 to read as follows): Key looks which may be locked from cities side may be permitted on main entrance doors only, provided they are kept unlocked during periods of public occupancy. Such key looks are prohibited on other egress doors, except in the case of museums, where the looks must also be equipped with electrical devices for remote control in the case of an emergency. However, key looks which may be looked from the outside only, may be used on any egress door which can be readily opened in the direction of egress without the use of a key at all times by devices such as panic hardware or similar hardware.
