ADVISORY: Civilian Complaint Review Board to Hold Public Board Meeting in Queens

New York, NY – The Civilian Complaint Review Board (CCRB) will hold its monthly Board Meeting at the Jacob A. Riis Neighborhood Settlement House on Thursday, September 12, 2019 at 6:30 p.m.

Representatives from the agency will provide an overview of CCRB complaint data from Queens, including complaint rates by precinct and the impact of body-worn camera evidence on cases originating in Queens.

All New Yorkers are welcome to share their experiences with police-community relations and to discuss how the agency can best serve the people of New York. CCRB investigators will be present to receive complaints of police misconduct.

The New York City Civilian Complaint Review Board (CCRB) is the largest police oversight entity in the nation and is empowered to investigate, mediate, prosecute, and recommend disciplinary action for complaints alleging misconduct by NYPD officers. See NYC Charter § 440(c)(1). The agency's jurisdiction includes excessive and unnecessary force, abuse of authority, discourtesy, and use of offensive language. To further this mission, CCRB issues monthly, biannual, and special statistical and qualitative reports analyzing trends and recurring issues arising from the many thousands of civilian complaints it receives each year.
