CARE OF THE TUBERCULOUS

Thousands of tuberculosis patients in New York City are receiving care and treatment under various medical auspices, both public and private. More lives are saved each year as health and welfare services are improved and adjusted to current needs. On December 31, 1960, there were 4,371 New Yorkers with active tuberculosis in sanatoria and hospitals, both in the city (3,698) and in out-of-town (673) institutions. Public and private clinics had under their care or supervision 2,619 persons with active disease. Private doctors indicated that at least 520 persons with active tuberculosis were under their supervision. There were additional thousands of New Yorkers, with arrested and inactive disease, under medical and public health supervision. Regardless of their means to pay persons may receive free treatment for tuberculosis at tuberculosis clinics and hospitals supported by the municipal and state agencies.

Although the number of individuals with active tuberculosis attend-CLINICS ing the Department of Health chest clinics has dropped in 1960, the total volume of work connected with care of clinic patients has continued at a high level.

Clinics of the Department of Hospitals and voluntary hospitals now take care of about one third as many patients with active tuberculosis as they did a few years ago. Whereas in 1950 fifty percent of all "clinic cases" with active disease were under non-Health Department care, in 1959 and in 1960 the proportion was 28 percent.





TYPE OF CARE BY ETHNIC GROUP

Type of care of persons with active tuberculosis when classified according to ethnic group presents some interesting distributions.

About half of the people with active tuberculosis are hospitalized mainly in institutions within the city, most in the Department of Hospitals institutions.

Among the whites and Negroes the proportion hospitalized was nearly 50 percent, among Puerto Ricans 43 percent and Yellow races 62 percent. Proportionately fewer of the white persons (26%) are under care of clinics as compared with the Negroes (33%) or Puerto Ricans (40%). Almost ten percent of white persons were under private physicians' care compared to 1.4 percent of the Negroes and 1.8 percent of the Puerto Ricans.

The Department of Health had under clinic supervision, on the last day of 1960, 18,405 tuberculosis cases in 25 clinics. These included 17,402 adults with pulmonary disease (Active = 1,563, Inactive, arrested and apparently cured cases = 15,600, Activity undetermined = 239), 262 children with pulmonary disease, 302 persons under care for pleurisy with effusion, and 439 with other forms of tuberculosis. Distribution of the patients by ethnic group listed 8,692 (47%) as white, 5,529 (30%) nonwhite and 4,184 (23%) as of Puerto Rican origin.

PRIVATE PHYSICIANS

Treatment by private physicians of registered active cases of tuberculosis has dropped to around five hundred indivi-

duals. On December 31, 1960, the proportion of persons reported receiving care for active tuberculosis under supervision of their private physicians was six percent, whereas in 1950 the proportion was fifteen percent. It is presumed that an increasing number of inactive cases receiving prolonged chemotherapy are under the care of private physicians but there is no specific information.

ANTIBACTERIAL DRUG TREATMENT

The Department of Health introduced in its tuberculosis clinics, beginning in July 1953, a large-scale program

of specific antibacterial drug treatment of patients. By the end of 1953 there were 1,111 persons on treatment, and their number continued to increase for the following seven years so that on December 31, 1960 there were 6,360 patients receiving antituberculosis drugs. Increasing drug treatment in clinics has been coincidental with diminishing bed complement in the hospitals.

HOSPITALIZATION FOR TUBERCULOSIS

The hospital continues to play a major role in the overall care of the tuberculous in New York City. Last year one-half of the patients with active tuberculosis were hospitalized for this disease. On December 31, 1960, of the 8,689 patients with all forms of active tuberculosis, 4,371,* or 50 percent, were under institutional care within the city or in hospitals out of town. The proportion of persons with pulmonary tuberculosis hospitalized had increased since 1940 as shown on the following table. However during the last decade this proportion has been around 50 percent.

During the 1940-1950 period there were several thousand more persons hospitalized each year than is the case today. At that time because of a bed shortage institutional facilities were unequal to the need and long waiting lists for admission were the rule. The peak was reached in 1952

^{*}It is to be noted that the figure of 4,371 patients (all forms of TB) in hospitals and sanatoria on the register as of December 31, 1960 does not appear to correspond with the patient census listed separately for the local individual institutions (2,909). This is due in part to the fact that there are some tuberculosis patients in general hospitals, both in and out of town, other than those listed in the local tuberculosis or chest services. Too, there may be a lag in reporting discharged patients to the Bureau of Tuberculosis thereby inflating somewhat the register figure.

when 9,606 New Yorkers with active tuberculosis (all forms) were in hospitals. Then there followed a drop in the total number of patients with active disease, a trend toward out-patient treatment in clinics and a subsequent easing of the bed situation so that access to a hospital bed was improved materially. The bed complement has also been substantially reduced so that fewer beds are available today than seven or eight years ago. It may be anticipated that many of the remaining facilities will continue to be used to their maximum capacity.

On December 31, 1960, 4,371 New York City residents with various forms of active tuberculosis were receiving hospital care in public and private institutions, both in and out of town. A large proportion of these people (3,698) was under institutional care within the city, mainly in hospitals under control of the Department of Hospitals of the City of New York. Other tuberculosis patients with arrested and inactive disease, therefore not in the "active" classification but under hospital care, are not included in the following tables.
