









ABOUT BRADHURST

Avenue NYC is a competitive grant program created by the NYC Department of Small Business Services to fund and build the capacity of community-based development organizations to execute commercial revitalization initiatives. Avenue NYC is funded through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program, which targets investments in low- and moderate-income neighborhoods.

Avenue NYC Commercial Revitalization grants provide multi-year commitments aimed at building the capacity of partner organizations to better understand neighborhood needs, develop impactful programs, and sustain their work in the community for at least three years.

The Commercial District Needs Assessment (CDNA) highlights a neighborhood's existing business landscape and consumer characteristics.

This CDNA features the 145th Street, Frederick Douglass Boulevard, Adam Clayton Powell Jr. Boulevard, Macombs Place, and 155th Street commercial corridors in Bradhurst, and was conducted in partnership with Harlem Congregations for Community Improvement between October 2023 and June 2024.

Key issues and opportunities identified through this assessment will help prioritize SBS-supported local investments, and serve as an informational and marketing resource for the neighborhood.

In This Report

Existing conditions, business data, and qualitative depictions of the neighborhood were gathered from more than **289 surveys** and various stakeholder meetings with neighborhood merchants, shoppers, workers, property owners, and residents.

Background

Located in northern Harlem, Bradhurst is bustling with cultural diversity, a vibrant history, and strong community ties. Bordered by the Harlem River to the northeast, Bradhurst is surrounded by the other historic neighborhoods of Sugar Hill and Strivers Row. With a reputation for resiliency and a legendary athletic past and present, Bradhurst presents opportunities for both economic and community development.

Since the 1920s, Bradhurst has been at the forefront of housing reform in New York City. To alleviate the housing crisis in Harlem, the Dunbar Apartments were one of the first cooperatives built specifically for the African American community. The Harlem River Houses were subsequently built as one of the city's earliest public housing developments, and both complexes are now designated New York City Landmarks. Beginning in the 1960s, the neighborhood suffered from disinvestment and a decline in adequate housing, leading Bradhurst to become a center of community-driven redevelopment and reinvestment. During the 1990s, community organizations worked with the city to rehabilitate buildings and reinvest in affordable housing, laying the foundation for current affordable living and commercial opportunities in the neighborhood.

Bradhurst was once home to the historic Polo Grounds, the stadium that housed the New York Giants baseball team. Today, sports lovers continue to flock to Bradhurst for annual basketball tournaments at Holcombe Rucker Park during the summer, a tradition dating back to the 1950s, which helped launched the careers of many notable players including Julius "Dr. J" Erving and Wilt Chamberlain. Jackie Robinson Park, one of Harlem's four historic parks, also serves as a neighborhood anchor for community programming and recreation.

Connections to multiple subway and bus routes make Bradhurst accessible from various points throughout the city. Centered around 145th Street, the neighborhood's commercial district extends across Frederick Douglass Boulevard, Adam Clayton Powell Jr. Boulevard, and St. Nicholas Avenue. These corridors offer a mixture of delis, restaurants, beauty salons, and other retail stores, many of which have served the community for generations.

Home to more than 50,000 residents, Bradhurst is a predominately Black neighborhood (56%) with a growing Hispanic population (30%). 24% of Bradhurst's residents are foreign-born, coming from countries across Africa, Latin America, and the Caribbean and contributing to the neighborhood's vast diversity of local businesses. Bradhurst's youth comprise 20% of the population, significantly higher than that of Manhattan (14%).


Future Opportunities

In 2022, Bradhurst was designated a Brownfield Opportunity Area (BOA) and received more than \$500,000 in funding from the New York State BOA Program. With this designation, the neighborhood will benefit from opportunities for revitalization and economic growth. Bradhurst's residents, many of whom have generational ties to the neighborhood, are vocal about the need for more youth-centered programming and investments that better serve the community. This sense of pride will be essential in ensuring that new developments benefit longstanding Bradhurst businesses and residents.

KEY FINDINGS & OPPORTUNITIES

Strengths

- Convenient transportation access with multiple subway lines, bus routes, the Henry Hudson Parkway to the west, and Harlem River Drive to the east
- Available commercial storefront spaces offer a range in size and price that are suitable for a diverse mix of retail
- Significant historic landmarks like Holcombe Rucker Park and Polo Grounds and nearby attractions like The Hip Hop Museum and Yankee Stadium draw visitors from across the city
- Wide streets and sidewalks under the 155th Street Viaduct and on Adam Clayton Powell Jr. Boulevard create opportunities for community programming and events
- A high concentration of Black-owned businesses and momand-pop shops reflects the diversity of the neighborhood and contributes to a strong sense of community pride
- An abundance of parks and green spaces throughout Bradhurst offer opportunities for recreation and encourage shoppers to spend time in the commercial district during warmer months

Challenges

- Increasing commercial rents prevent merchants from providing affordable prices to customers and have forced some longstanding and new merchants to close their businesses
- Sanitation issues and illegal dumping on the sidewalk present challenges for maintaining corridor cleanliness and diminish the sense of community pride
- A lack of diversity in business types including healthy food options and sit-down restaurants discourages residents from shopping locally and reflects residents' health concerns
- Poor storefront conditions, empty lots, and a notably higher commercial vacancy rate than the city- and borough-wide averages discourage shoppers from spending time in the commercial district
- Community members have expressed concern over a lack of youth-centered businesses and activities given the significantly high youth population
- Open spaces around Macombs Triangle and under the 155th Street Viaduct are underutilized and lack programming

















Opportunities

- Provide new recreational and employment opportunities for young people through programming and merchant partnerships
- Engage local business owners to grow and build the capacity of the Bradhurst Merchants Association, which will enable them to pool resources and advocate for increased protections for small businesses
- Activate underutilized space under the 155th Street Viaduct with community events that celebrate the neighborhood's history and draw residents to the commercial corridors
- Collaborate with city agencies, residents, and merchants to implement new sanitation programs and promote cleaner streets
- Launch district marketing initiatives that showcase the business offerings in the neighborhood for residents and visitors
- Improve connectivity to nearby neighborhoods by expanding waterfront access for residents and visitors

- Attract new business types to fill vacant storefronts and respond to local consumer demand
- Enhance community pride and increase perceptions of safety with beautification efforts, landscaping, and improved street lighting
- ► Install new wayfinding to foster stronger pedestrian connections to surrounding neighborhoods and highlight historic sites such as Holcombe Rucker Park and Polo Grounds
- Support entrepreneurs seeking to launch or grow their businesses by establishing new incubator spaces and connections to public and private resources








Change in Total Business Sales, 2017-2024




Change in Median Sales by Business, 2017-2024




How much do you typically spend when you shop in Bradhurst?



How do you usually travel to Bradhurst?




How often do you shop in Bradhurst?

Storefront Vacancies





Streetscape Observations

- Dog waste, litter, and illegal dumping on the sidewalks create an unappealing shopping environment; additional trash cans and bottle recycling stations could promote cleaner streets
- ▶ Increased street lighting along 145th Street and Lenox Avenue would improve perceptions of safety and encourage more commercial activity at night
- ► Tree pits and gardens located near seating areas and benches throughout the neighborhood would benefit from regular maintenance and plantings
- Traffic congestion due to deliveries and double parking along 145th Street and Frederick Douglass Boulevard impede pedestrian mobility and safety
- Vacancies across the commercial district lead to poorly maintained storefronts and hinder retail continuity
- With low levels of traffic on 155th Street, the road below the Viaduct stands out as a promising site for physical and programmatic improvements to promote pedestrian activation


Commuting Patterns


